A TOKEN OF OUR APPRECIATION

The subject of parish finances is always a very difficult tightrope for Parish Priests to walk. You will have heard criticism of Priests who never mention or allude to finances and are accused of neglecting the Parish and

Priests who mention finances more than once a year and are labelled as being obsessed with money.

Just some clarifications with regard to parish finances. You might like to keep this in case the matter comes up for discussion in non-ecclesial settings. Firstly, none of the Priests of the Parish know who contributes, how often or how much and that is the way I would like to keep it.

Parishioner's contributions are kept in coded form and not identifiable. Secondly, contributions to the family offering are not used for income for clergy and are used only in and for our Parish. All monies collected from the shrine of Saint Anthony are used for charitable purposes WITHOUT deduction of the cost of the candles.

Many of our parishioners donate over €250 in any given year in Family Offering and Christmas and Easter Dues. If this applies to you please make contact with the Parish Office. Recent changes now allow the Parish to claim back the charity tax from parishioners who are self-assessed or whose incomes include share dividends and rental income. This is NOT an extra tax but as a registered charity we can claim a rebate on contributions already made.

Do you still have 'old Irish' notes or coins lying around? We can exchange these at the Central Bank for Euro. Likewise, Sterling notes and coins that you may no longer need can be accepted as well. We get large amounts of foreign coins and notes that are of no use to us but I recently deposited all of them at a charity box so they haven't gone to waste.

Finally the counting team showed me the great collection of shopping trolley tokens that we received in the collections in the past few months. Maybe they were put in by mistake but should you wish to avoid fumbling for one or two euro coins when shopping in the future you could 'buy' a shopping token from us!

On behalf of the Parish Finance Committee and the Parish Team I thank once again, our contributors, collectors and counters.



Next Friday, 17th March we celebrate the Feast of St. Patrick

a Holy Day of Obligation & our National holiday. Saint Patrick is the patron saint of Ireland as he was the one who brought Christianity to the Irish.

According to legend, Saint Patrick used a shamrock to explain about God. He told the people that the shamrock was like the idea of the Trinity, that in the one God there are three Divine Persons: the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. The shamrock was sacred to the Druids, so Saint Patrick's use of it in explaining

the Trinity was very wise. It's the only day during Lent that we dispense with the Lenten fast and have the church decorated.

Catechism The Full Revelation of Prayer - The New Testament The Gospel according to St. Luke emphasises the action of the Holy Spirit and the meaning of prayer in Christ's ministry. Jesus prays before the decisive moments of his mission. When Jesus prays he is already teaching us how to pray. He speaks openly of the Father and the Holy Spirit to

his disciples, who are the teachers of prayer in his Church. In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus lays down that there must be a true conversion of heart if we are to draw near to God. Jesus assures us that


