Today we are celebrating the third Sunday of Advent. We light the candle of "Joy". Today is also known as "Gaudete Sunday". Gaudete in Latin means "rejoice". We are urged not to worry, for the Lord is near. But, for some, at this time of year rejoicing can be the furthest thing from their mind. Sometimes life just hurts. I wish there were a more delicate way to say that. I wish there were a clever



way to explain this fact away — maybe some whimsical cliché that we can all have a chuckle over? But I've got nothing. The truth is there are days when the burdens of life can weigh on us so heavy that we're not sure how we'll lift it, much less carry it around. Around the middle of December it can be easy to be swept up in the holly, jolly tide of Christmas cheer. If life has dealt you a good hand, it's a quite enjoyable time of the year. But if life has dealt you a bad hand, if you have lost a loved one during the year then that tide of Christmas joy can feel like it's drowning you. What do we do with this?

For starters, we can call to mind that Advent is a season for people who are in darkness waiting for the sort of light that will save them. You can't commercialise or turn a profit on this sort of thing. Living in darkness and waiting for a great light isn't very easy to market either. Maybe that's why it's so easy to forget (or avoid) this reality when we're rushing through the season's numerous to-do lists. The author Taylor Caldwell writes, "I am not alone at all, I thought. I was never alone at all. And that, of course, is the message of Christmas. We are never alone. Not when the night is darkest, the wind coldest, the world seemingly most indifferent. For this is still the time God chooses. This season is still the time God chooses to bring the world's greatest hope into the very darkness of life that can seemingly weigh us down every day. There is, indeed, hope for those who live in darkness. May we stand in solidarity with those for whom darkness is an all too familiar reality this season. May we experience and share this light together. May we be this light for others and maybe, just maybe if we look through the chaos, the pain and the struggle we can glimpse our true hope, the child in a manger.

We hear today and over the next few weeks about the 'Peace of God' in our hearts that we will feel when we just "reach out" in prayer to God. St Paul in the second reading says, "There is no need to worry; but if there is anything you need, pray for it, asking God for it with prayer and thanksgiving". Maybe this week is a good time to rejoice. Rejoice that we are never alone, never forgotten. Our God is a faithful God who walks with us, is in the depth of our struggles and envelopes us with unconditional love and compassion. The Third Sunday of Advent is called Gaudete (Rejoice) Sunday. On this day we celebrate that our waiting for the birth of Jesus on Christmas day is almost over. Rose is a liturgical colour that is used to signify joy, so we light the single pink candle on the third Sunday of Advent.

Today is also called "Shepherd's Candle" reminding us of the Joy the world experienced at the coming birth of Jesus.

on the half hour. The photo is taken from last year's performance - an unforgettable experience wafted away to the strains of traditional Palestine background music. A review of not just the year gone out but since 1945 - submitted by Breda Grace, a long time contributor to the Newsletter:

I was born before television, before penicillin, polio shots, frozen foods, Xerox, plastic, contact lenses, videos, Frisbees and the Pill. I was born before radar, credit cards, split atoms, laser beams and ball point pens; before dishwaters, tumble dryers, electric blankets, air conditioners, drip dry clothes and before man walked on the moon. I thought fast food was what you ate in Lent, and a "Big Mac" was an oversized raincoat. I existed before house husbands, computer dating, dual cars and when a "meaningful relationship" meant getting along with people and "sheltered accommodation" was where you waited for a bus. I was born before day care centres, group homes and disposable nappies. I never heard of FM Radio, tape decks, electric typewriters, artificial beards, word processors, yoghurt or young men wearing earrings. For me "time sharing" meant togetherness, a "chip" was a piece of wood or fried potatoes, "hardware" meant nuts and bolts and "software" wasn't a word. Before 1945 pizzas, McDonalds and instant coffee were unheard of. Cigarette smoking was fashionable, "grass" was mown, coke was kept in the coal house, a "joint" was what was eaten on Sundays and "pot" was something you cooked in. "Rock Music" was a fond mother's lullaby.

We who were born before 1945 must be a hardy bunch when you think of the way in which the world had changed and the adjustments we have had to make. And we wonder why we are confused and there is a generation gap today. But by the Grace of Godwe have survived!! "Happy New Year" to everyone!! (Breda, many thanks - you brought a smile to many and I'm sure you can add a lot more to Breda's list)


