The World Meeting of Families comes to Ireland!

Dublin has been chosen by Pope Francis to host the next World Meeting of Families in August 2018. Started by Saint John Paul II, and held every three years, this major world event celebrates family as the cornerstone of our lives, and the fundamental building block of society and the Church.

Families and others from all over the world will gather in Dublin from 22-26 August 2018 to celebrate their lives together, to share their experiences from different parts of the world, to reflect on the different challenges they face and to grow together in faith. The theme chosen by Pope Francis for WMOF2018 is *The Gospel of the Family: Joy for the World*. The WMOF2018 Logo, launched in December 2016, reflects on this theme and our journey towards August 2018.

The event will consist of a joyful and reflective programme of workshops, talks and discussions for adults; an engaging and exciting programme for young people as well as faith and fun activities for children. WMOF2018 will include the daily celebration of Mass, a festival of families event, exhibitions, cultural events and musical performances, events around the city,

gestures of solidarity with those in need, and much more.

World Meeting of Families is promoted by the Holy See's Dicastery for Laity, the Family and Life. In September 2016, this new Dicastery brought together the Pontifical Council for the Laity, the Pontifical Council for the Family and the Pontifical Academy for Life. The Prefect of the new Dicastery is Dublin-born Cardinal-elect Kevin Joseph Farrell, previously Bishop of Dallas, Texas.

The WMOF is organised by a host diocese chosen by the Pope. For 2018, Pope Francis chose the Archdiocese of Dublin, in Ireland. To fulfil this task, the Archdiocese of Dublin has appointed a team to work with the families, young people, women and men, clergy, religious and others from all over Ireland who will be involved in the planning of the event. Father Timothy Bartlett has been appointed as Secretary General and Anne Griffin as General Manager for WMOF2018.



The Little Way.



'The Christian of the future will be a mystic or he or she will not exist at all'.

These words were written by Fr. Karl Rahner S.J, the German Theologian. To help us to

understand what he meant by these words we have a wonderful example of what constitutes a mystic in the much loved St. Therese of Lisieux or The Little Flower as she is commonly known. Therese was born in France in 1873 and at the age of 15 obtained permission from her Bishop to enter the Carmelite convent in Lisieux. Unknown to anyone outside her family and the nuns in her convent, she lived a simple life there for 9 years until her death at the age of 24 in 1897.

From her childhood Therese had the desire to become a saint, but in comparing herself with other saints she had heard about, she felt as far removed from them as a grain of sand, trampled down by all who passed by. However she was not going to be discouraged; she said as she was too small to climb the steep stairs to perfection she would find a lift. She found the lift in the words of Scripture 'whoever is a little one, let that person come to me' (Proverbs 9:4). She realised to reach heaven she did not have to become great. On the contrary she could stay little and trust in the love of God. She knew as a Carmelite nun she might never be able to perform great deeds in the world. She wrote: Love proves itself by deeds, so how am I to show my love? Great deeds are forbidden me. The only way I can prove my love is by scattering flowers and these flowers are every little sacrifice, every glance and word, and the doing of the least actions for love. This is how Therese lived. As she lay dying she said; 'I will spend my heaven doing good on earth'

During her last years on earth, following the instructions of her sisters, (her three sisters were also nuns in the same convent) Therese wrote the story of her life. As she wrote this record of her short life she could never have imagined the wonderful spiritual classic she was leaving to the world. The book was published shortly after her death entitled Autobiography of a Saint and has sold and still sells millions of copies all over the world. St. Teresa of Lisieux's message is simple; to take every single opportunity of making some small sacrifice, here by a smiling look, there by a kindly word; always doing it all for LOVE. Annetta Maguire
