PIETY AND PENITENCE

Jesus and his followers were all Jews. The parables that Jesus spoke are products of first century Jewish culture. To recover the punch of these parables one must view them through first century Jewish eyes and hear them with first century Jewish ears.

The parable of the Pharisee and the tax collector, found in Luke18:9-14, is not as challenging to us as it was when told by Jesus to a first century Jewish audience. The reason being

that Luke fills his Gospel with righteous tax collectors, including Levi (known as Matthew) and Zacchaeus who publicly declared that he was willing to repay anyone he defrauded. In Jesus' time an honest tax collector would have been a contradiction. On the other hand Pharisees get a bad press in Luke. In Jesus' time they were regarded as elitists with strict religious observances.

Jesus came to reveal the true nature of the Father, to change our thinking about God and thus about one another.

The parable opens with two men going up to the Temple and concludes with the same two men leaving the sacred space and returning to the ordinary space of their homes. The setting of the parable in the Temple is essential to the story. Hearing the parable through first century Jewish ears - ears that would have been listening to Jesus himself- all three characters were well known to Jesus' hearers; all three would have been greeted by predictable responses from the hearers. The Temple is the sacred space of God's dwelling, the Pharisee is the upright religious man and the tax collector is the despised outcast. By the end of the parable, however, the hearer is left confused and shocked because the despised tax collector's prayer is accepted within God's own house, while the Pharisee's prayer is not.

The Pharisee stands alone and gives thanks to God that he is not like the rest of the people whom the Temple would not approve of, thieves, rogues, adulterers and the particular tax collector who was standing within earshot. After describing what he is not he lists what he does. He fasts, supports the Temple and pays his taxes. Both he and Jesus' hearers would expect that the God of Israel, resident in the Temple, would accept his prayer.

The tax collector, on the other hand, stands inconspicuously with head bowed beating his breast and asking for God's mercy. The surprise comes with Jesus' comment 'This man went down to his house justified rather than the other'. Jesus came to reveal the true nature of the Father, to change our thinking about God and thus about one another. This is the Good News of to-day's gospel.

Let us rejoice and be glad!

Catechism
of the
Catholic

As we commence our studies of a new section of the catechism - The Ten Commandments - our attention is drawn to an extract from a talk given by Bishop Brendan Kelly of Achonry at our recent conference in Knock. Bishop Kelly began with a prayer by St Robert Bellarmine, author of two catechisms and the patron saint of catechists.

"O Lord, good and forgiving and abounding in steadfast love who would not serve you with all his heart, when he has begun at least to taste the sweetness of your fatherly rule? What do you order your servants to do, Lord? 'Take my yoke upon you', you say, 'and my burden is light.' Who would not willingly carry a yoke which does not press down but gives strength, and a burden which does not weigh heavily but refreshes? With justification, then, you also say, 'and you will find rest for your souls'. What is this yoke of yours that does not tire but brings rest? It is that great and first commandment: you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart'. For what is easier, better and more agreeable than to love goodness, beauty and love, all of which you are, O Lord my God?"


