JESUS, THE EVERLASTING WORD

St. John's Gospel is the only one that does not tell us the Christmas story. No Bethlehem, no stable, no crib, no shepherds, no wise men. John is the most mystical of the four evangelists and he begins his Gospel in a style typical of him. "In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God and the Word was God".



Jesus, the eternal Word, stepped into our world with its limits of time and space.

Why does John call Jesus the Word? Because the word spoken by God is the source of all that God created. In the Book of Genesis, we are given an account of the creation story. In the beginning God said "Let there be light" and there was light. Then God said "Let the waters gather in one place and the dry land appear". Then God said "Let us make man in our own image and likeness". The source of everything God creates is the word spoken by him to bring all things into being. This is not all airy fairy, mystical spiritual stuff, it is very practical. We human beings, made in God's image and likeness, share in his creativity. We too create - not quite in the same way as God, as only he can create out of nothing. Once we have the raw material there is no end to our creativity. It is our communication, our spoken and written words which are the source of everything we create.

Jesus was the Word who was with God and was God from the beginning. Then the Word became flesh, the Divine became human, Jesus came among us. 2000 years later what Jesus said, did and taught is known to us through the words communicated to us in the Gospels. The words first written by

Matthew, Mark, Luke and John turned the world upside down when they were first heard. It would be hard to find other words that left their mark on humanity as profoundly as these words. Jesus, the Eternal Word,

became flesh, the human became Divine so that he could divinize us. When we are divinized then we become all we are meant to be - we are fully alive and the glory of God is a man or woman fully alive. **Fr. Padraig**
