





### Today's Scripture - "TEACHER. WHICH COMMANTMENT IN THE LAW IS THE GREATEST?"

When the Pharisees heard that he had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together, and one of them, a lawyer, asked him a question to test him. "Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" He said to him, "'You shall love the Lord your Commandment God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.' This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.' On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets."



#### Take a little time to reflect

The greatest and first commandment is challenging. Do I really believe in God and love God? God's love shines on me like the sun shines on earth. Nothing I do could make God love me more. In this continual relationship with the mystery of God's love, I know my doubts. I can only say "Lord I believe, help my unbelief."

The second commandment is easier to grasp and harder to follow: Love your neighbour as yourself. We are called, compelled even, to share this love with others. God is visible in my neighbour. How does my faith call me to show my love for others - be they those close to me or not. What is my attitude towards every stranger around the world who is my sister and brother. I pray for them. What are my actions on behalf of "my neighbour?"

### WHO ARE THE SADDUCEES? WHO ARE THE PHARISEES?

The Sadducees had a "let's not rock the boat" mentality which caused them to live a life of compromise. They tended to be wealthy, upper class and held powerful positions. In General they seemed to be more concerned with politics than religion. Because they were accommodating to Rome. Because of their positioning they did not relate well to the common man, nor did the common man hold them in high opinion. Religiously, the Sadducees were more conservative in one main area of doctrine. The Sadducees did not believe in the resurrection, angels or the spiritual realm because they did not believe in the Scriptures and so were ignorant of the power of God. The God they believed in was a god of their own liking for their own benefit so they wouldn't have to answer to the true God, or so they believed. For them Jesus was a teacher.

In contrast to the Sadducees, the Pharisees were mostly middle-class businessmen, and therefore were in contact with the common people. The Pharisees were held in much higher esteem by the common people than the Sadducees. Religiously, they accepted the written Word as inspired by God. At the time of Christ's earthly ministry, this would have been what is now our Old Testament. But they also gave equal authority to oral tradition and attempted to defend this position by saying it went all the way back to Moses.

Tuesday: Halloween

The Pharisees gave oral tradition equal authority to the written Word of God, while the Sadducees considered only the written Word to be from God. Because the Sadducees were more concerned with politics than religion, they were unconcerned with Jesus until they became afraid He might bring unwanted Roman attention. It was at this point that the Sadducees and Pharisees united and conspired to put Christ to death. Though the Pharisees were rivals of the Sadducees, they managed to set aside their differences on one occasion—the trial of Christ. It was at this point that the Sadducees and Pharisees united to put Christ to death.

### Monday Club 23 October 2017

Last week due to the bad weather there was no club in the interest of safety due to the storm.

This week we moved to the Maldron Hotel for the information morning given by Prof. Des O'Neill.

It was organized by "Older Voices for

Change" which is a local advocacy group made up of older people from the areas of Dublin Mid West. The aim of the group is to identify issues affecting older people in the community and advocate for change bringing these issues to the attention of policy makers and service providers in society. This group has been in existence since 2011 and is supported by South Dublin County Partnership.

It got underway with Prof. O'Neill speaking on all the issues relating to ageing. Ageing is a state of mind and it is the way we approach it depends on how well we are. The bottom line is keep active, eat well, exercise, at least 30mins brisk walk per day where possible, have social outlets - it can combat isolation and loneliness. We are a valuable asset to society. We share our experiences, our gifts of e.g. music, crafts, childminding, babysitting, caring plus many more. He spoke about dementia, how to access the various services which can be accessed by referral from GPs. He also touched on nursing homes, fair deal scheme. GP & PHN are very up to date on developments in this area, drugs which taken as we age, avoiding where possible. In the case of acute illness do not go to private hospitals as they are not fully equipped.

Prof O'Neill had 10-15 minutes question and answer session following his talk. He has written a very informative book "Ageing & Caring" available in Eason's Bookshop.

Following on from Prof O'Neill there was Dr Rory Nee who is a consultant geriatrician/physician in St James' Hospital. He spoke about the different processes in hospital of who you will see for example if admitted to A& E from triage to discharge, all the services available in St James's Hospital. The Mercers Institute based in James's is the largest of this kind in Europe and provides all sorts of tests. There is also LAMP (local assist mapping project) which can check what services are within your own area.

There are plans for the future to making Ireland the best in the world to age. Some of the aims are to provide a better community services to the elderly in their own homes. Again the GP is the first point of referral. Despite the delay in starting it was a really worthwhile morning full of useful information. Thank you to all concerned.

We finished off the morning with soup, sandwiches and tea/ coffee.

Next Monday (Halloween) 30th October we will be back in the club when we welcome back the girls and boys of LOCALISE with all their tricks and treats up their sleeves. Look forward next week and see you all then. Take care.




We consider the granting of this award a mark of recognition for the work Máirín has done to make

## Altar list of the Dead Envelopes now available in the Church

Please enter the names of deceased family members and a donation if desired. Envelopes to be returned to the Church as soon as possible. Either to the Sacristy, Office , shop or placed in the secure safe at the entrance to the shop. All Masses during November and on the 1st Friday of each month during the year are offered for all whose names are on the Altar List of the Dead

Envelopes will also be available if by any chance one was not delivered to you.

#### Memorial Garden



Ministers of the Liturgical Environment will erect a Memorial Garden at the Sacred Heart Altar. It will feature "Tree of Life" where you can enter the name of the deceased you are praying for and hang it on the tree. You are also welcome to place a plant, flower of your choice in the garden.

## Annual Mass for all who died in the Parish during the year

The Mass will be celebrated on Monday 20th November. This Newsletter is the only means of letting people know. We depend on neighbours and friends of deceased to notify relatives and friends who do not live in Clondalkin. A member of the family presents a lighted candle during the Mass.

How to gain indulgences for the Holy Souls

A Plenary Indulgence can be gained only one per day. The faithful must be in the state of grace and these three conditions must accompany the prescribed act: You must receive the sacrament of confession, either eight days before or after the pious act is performed, receive Holy Communion on that day and recite prayers for the intentions of the Holy Father (one Our Father and one Hail Mary is the minimum, but any other additional prayers may be added). You may also visit a graveyard and pray for the dead. All indulgences are applicable only to the Holy Souls.

Why do we pray for the dead?

Catholics believe in purgatory. This means that some of us aren't ready for Heaven when we die so some time of purification is necessary before we are ready to face God's Glory. In part some of our prayers ask God to show mercy. Our prayers are also to praise God for His goodness and mercy and as Christ rose from the dead so will we rise with him at the end of time!
