

Q. Saint Paul wrote that he opposed Peter in public because he was clearly wrong (Gal 2:11). If Scripture says that the first pope, Peter was clearly wrong, how can Catholics say that the pope is infallible?

A. Their disagreement was regarding Peter's policy of not eating with Gentiles lest it offend the sensibility of Jewish Christians, although he accepted their equality. We read Paul's version of their meeting but I'd love to hear Peter's side of the story. Paul was confrontational in his approach, which isn't always the best policy. It landed him in trouble in Damascus and, later in Rome. Peter was more sensitive and diplomatic in dealing with people and their sensitivities. The matter had nothing to do with infallibility.

Q. I have a problem with what the Lord said about our prayers being always answered... 'ask and it will be given to you etc.' I have prayed earnestly for many requests which have not been granted.

A. We all have that experience of not getting exactly what we requested. We have to trust that God knows what is best and sees things in a more expansive picture. Jesus went on to point to the example of how a loving parent does not always give children what they request. Sometimes there is too much of me in our prayers and we forget that we are one with others in the body or community of Christ. Perhaps my prayer is answered by a grace given to some other person as well as some grace given to me which I have not recognised.



CALMING THE STORM – JESUS' HUMANITY AND HIS DIVINITY

Last week we heard of the Gnostics and their doubts about the humanity of Jesus. There was another group in the early church who did the opposite – they doubted the divinity of Jesus. These were the followers of Arius – the Arians. Arius was a charismatic priest who put out the idea that Jesus could not have been God. He was a very good man, perhaps he was the greatest man ever, deserving our utmost respect but Jesus was not God. Arius maintained that he was created by God for the task of living among us for 33 years to teach us how to live well through what he did, what he said and the example he gave. Arius was a gifted speaker and he influenced a lot of Christians who believed he was right. There was a serious danger that this bitter dispute would cause a split in Christianity - it was like an intellectual civil war within the church.

In 325 the Church convened the Council of Nicea where the Nicean creed we recite every Sunday at Mass was drawn up. This was powerful refutation of Arianism and it largely faded away only to surface again later in a different guise. In our Gospel from Chapter 8 of Matthew he stands up in the boat and miraculously calms the storm. If Jesus was not divine he could never have done this, indeed if he was not divine he could never have saved us. We human beings on our own are too weak, fickle and confused to save ourselves. We Christians who recognise this also recognises our need for a saviour and the saviour must be divine. Jesus came that we may have life and have it to the full. The life he gives has its source in the Mass where he is fully present in body, soul and divinity. The bread of life that feeds us is what gives us life and the glory of God is a man or woman fully alive.
