corruption but that does not give us the right to opt out completely of our responsibilities to society and to government. It would seem that the best antidote to corruption and tyranny is a form of democracy where a nation is run on the principal of government for the people by the people combined with an agreed constitution that all are subject to.

Jesus paid his taxes and urged his followers to do the same for the sake of the common good. He lived under a government that was not democratic and was in many ways corrupt. But at least Pax Romana kept order in society and provided for the basic need of its citizens. It was better by far than having an utterly chaotic situation of rampant criminality and tribal wars. Christ's general principal was to be critically obedient to the authorities but obedience to God first. There were those who advocated violent revolution against Rome by Jesus remained aloof and what a wise course of action it proved to be. The most famous rebel against Rome was Spartacus who led the slave revolt and held out against the might of the Roman army for 2 years before he was eventually defeated. The heroic Spartacus warrants but a footnote in history while Jesus and the religion he founded has outlived all empires either before or since. The early Christians changed the Roman Empire not by war and revolution but by enculturation and assimilation. In other words they Christianises what was good in paganism. They gave good example and they fought evil by doing good. They did not use the weapons of swords, spears and daggers but rather the weapons of love, truth and beauty.

So finally it is a good thing that we pray for our government and public

representatives. They do not have an easy job. We ask the Lord to help us to have the generosity to support then when they do what is good and the courage to criticise them when they don't. Above all we pray that we will be a good example to all we meet and have the courage to fight evil by doing good.



## **NEW FEAST DAY**

Being inquisitive as to the celebration of the new Feast Day of Our Lady of Knock on the 17<sup>th</sup> August I discovered it was included in the New Missal which came into use last Advent.

Regarding the new missal, in my investigation I found this head line in a national newspaper "November launch for contentious new missal" and continuing "The controversial new missal will be introduced..."

It is difficult to believe that we have the new missal almost a year without "controversy or contention". In truth it seems to me that the new missal has always been with us.

Incidentally St. Pio and St Edith Steins are among other new saints included in the new missal.

## ST. JOHN WALL

On Thursday, 29<sup>th</sup> August, we celebrate the Feast of St. John Wall – no **not** our Fr. John.

St John Wall was born in 1620 in Preston, Lancashire. He entered the English College, Douai (in modern-day northern France) in 1641, and was ordained a Catholic priest in 1645. He returned to his homeland for several years, saying Mass for the Catholics who stayed loyal to the papacy.

In 1678, after 22 years of ministry he was apprehended under suspicion of being a party to the Titus Oates plot and sent to Worcester jail. After being sent to London he was brought back to Worcester and executed for being a Catholic priest and exercising as such.

He steadfastly refused to forsake his religion, was hung drawn and quartered on 22nd August 1679

He was canonised on 25<sup>th</sup> October 1970 by Pope Paul VI
