hell broke loose in the killing of millions of people, the destruction of lives and property, the genocides, the abuse of millions of prisoners and refugees. And yet it came to an end, it spun itself out, it was contained. We could ask ourselves why isn't it World War all the time, why did the upheaval and mayhem not continue? Because good will always prevail – we've had peace in Europe now for 60 years – that in itself is a miracle. All the more extraordinary is that forgiveness and reconciliation between former enemies became a reality.

I conclude with a reflection from St. Francis de Sales: "Do not look forward anxiously to what may happen tomorrow, the same everlasting Lord who take care of you today will take care of you tomorrow and every day. He will either shield you from suffering or give you unfailing strength to bear it. Be at peace then and put aside all anxious thoughts and imaginations!

OUR TRIALS AND TRIBULATIONS

St Paul in his 2nd letter to the Corinthians tells us "trials of every sort come to us but we are not discouraged, we are left without an answer, but we do not despair. We are persecuted but not abandoned, knocked down but not crushed. In the ups and downs of life periods like this come to all of us and sometimes it seems as though we can be overwhelmed by the suffering and evil of the world. There are a few things we can remember when we are caught up in the storms of life and trying to persevere in our faith. First we have to accept that trials will come to everyone at some time in their life. There are periods when prayer is easy and God seems very close. Everything goes well. Then there are times when nothing seems to go right. Prayer is a struggle and God seems far away. It is a good rule of thumb to be aware that God's help in a time of trial is given at the moment of need and not before. Grace is given when we are at or near rock bottom and if we are open to receiving God's grace suffering can strengthen us rather than break us – it brings forth courage, forbearance, generosity, faithfulness. These things come about when we are not dependant on the sweetness of good feelings that we get when everything goes right but rather in the absence of good feelings, in times of adversity and challenge. Most miracles happen slowly. In our courageous, patient perseverance of past suffering we have much to offer those who suffer now. A recovered addict is often the best help for those who are trapped in addiction now, those who have experienced a physical illness are often the best resource for those who are ill now. A person who has experienced bereavement is often the best support for those going through the loss of a loved one.

It also helps to see the big picture. The great wonder is not that there is so much evil in the world but that there is so much good. Evil does not prevail – it ultimately burns itself out in its own self destruction, it is contained even though it remains present in the world. The greatest catastrophe in the history of humanity was the 2^{nd} World War – a time when it seemed all
