When I was working in London 20 years ago there was a saving about the celebrities who were the centre of attention at the time that they were famous for being famous. They got themselves into all the right nightclubs, went to all the right parties and schemed their way into the right circle of the great and the good.

20 years later these celebrities have long been knocked off their pedestals and their present day replacements won't last long either. This is a sad situation and it is even sadder that there are very few heroes for our young people to look up to and emulate. The celebrities they are presented with are all too often vulnerable. flawed individuals whose personal lives are in disarray. It is no wonder that the glare to the limelight gets to be too painful and many of them resort to drugs and alcohol abuse.

And so there is a vacuum in our western THE PATH TO HEROISM" - PART 1 civilization. It intends to encourage the Go the road less travelled and enter by the mediocre and the superficial instead of fostering real greatness. In spite of the short-comings of our society many of us To get to heaven first give heaven. Living want to be great, want to be heroes. Even the most selfish hedonist seeks to be great in his quiet reflective moments. That is one of the extraordinary aspects of human fulfilling when it is an adventure – it nature, we don't always like what is easy, we are attracted to what is difficult. FOR BETTER OR FOR WORSE

The brides and grooms who exchanged vows this week were blessed with glorious weather. As a daily walker in our beautiful Corkagh Park, I have experienced all weathers, ranging from the frosty February mornings to the energy sapping days of the past week. On Friday a spectator stand was placed at the baseball diamond and the cricket field prepared for a forthcoming match. Two decades ago it would have been unimaginable that baseball and cricket would be played on a regular basis here in Clondalkin.

Last Sunday on the pilgrimage walk, organised by the combined Catholic Parishes of Clondalkin, we paused at the Round Tower and reflected on the Christians who lived there. Reverend Alan Ruffli, rector of Saint John's very kindly gave us a guided tour of the church explaining its history and then we had some free time to look around the grounds including the graveyard. Pilgrims saw the graves of friends and neighbours from childhood. People of all dominations are buried in the gravevard including one of my predecessors who died in 1812 aged 35 years. He is buried alongside Father Chris Coleman also a former curate at Clondalkin parish. This surprised me as it showed a certain tolerance between the two churches as this was before Catholic Emancipation which didn't happen until 1829. Maybe some parishioners can shed some light on the history.

My ramblings remind me that the past can never be our prisoner and we cannot be prisoners of the past. The monks who came here in 631, builders of the tower in 815, Christians who worshipped and died for their faith, those who built the previous church on Monastery Road and the builders of our present church all faced challenges as they lived out their faith. Previous generations responded to the challenge to live the Gospel as must we in our time. Enjoy the good weather.

PRIMACY OF CONSCIENCE

During the week we have heard a lot about "Conscience" and how we understand it.

Conscience is not the final arbiter of what is morally right, nor has the Church ever taught that it is. In its truest sense, conscience is the intellectual apprehension of the Divine Law. For this reason, Divine Law is primary.

"The Divine Law is the supreme rule of our actions; our thoughts, desires, words, acts, all that man is, - is subject to the domain of the law of God: and this law is the rule of our conduct by means of our conscience. Hence it is never lawful to go against our conscience " (Cardinal Gousset) But conscience does not mean that Catholics are free to act on the basis of what they personally judge is morally right in spite of Church teaching—teaching formulated by Christ's Vicar on earth through the power of the Holy Spirit and authority of Christ to the church He founded.

Don't forget our summer break to Letterkenny in Donegal 25th, 26th and 27th July, **SOME PLACES STILL AVAILABLE**.


Our trip to Donegal will be the last outing before we break up for the Summer. Return again in September.

The Preamble to our Constitution reads:

"In the Name of the Most Holy Trinity, from Whom is all authority and to Whom, as our final end, all actions both of men and States must be referred, We, the people of Éire, Humbly acknowledging all our obligations to our Divine Lord, Jesus Christ, Who sustained our fathers through centuries of trial,



And seeking to promote the common good, with due observance of Prudence, Justice and Charity, so that the dignity and freedom of the individual may be assured, true social order attained, the unity of our country restored, and concord established with other nations,

Do hereby adopt, enact, and give to ourselves this Constitution".

The Constitution was adopted by the people of Ireland in 1937, well worth studying!
