Gregory was the first Pope to formulate the Papal title "Servant of the Servants of God" and he lived his papacy according to this motto. If only all the other Popes had followed his example we would not have had any bad Popes and the corruption in which they indulged.

Pope Gregory served the church, he served the vulnerable people of Rome and on top of all that he served the civil needs of the Political order. He never wanted to be involved in politics but only he had the leadership qualities needed by the besieged people of Rome in their hour of need.

Pope Gregory's greatest achievement came in the last years of his life when he was practically bed ridden from a mysterious illness. This weak sickly man was Pope St. Gregory the Great because he was fully alive. The Glory of God was in his spirit which did the great things his broken body could not do.



WHAT WAS SO GREAT ABOUT ST. GREGORY THE GREAT

The Glory of God is a man or woman fully alive. Pope St. Gregory the Great was one of the Popes of the early church. He came to the Papacy in 590AD and was the 64th Pope in the line from the first Pope, St. Peter. He is not just Pope St. Gregory he is St. Gregory the GREAT. He did just about everything. He dealt with heresies, disputes, schisms and other complex church issues. He was also the civil leader in the chaos of the city of Rome which was under siege from barbarian tribes at that time. Pope Gregory negotiated peace deals, got food and water into the city and set up hospitals. He also developed the churches music especially Gregorian chant which is called after him.

Pope Gregory never wanted to be Pope and he certainly never wanted to be involved in politics. All he wanted to do was to be a monk and live a life of prayer in a monastery. But the Holy Spirit had other ideas – there was a vacuum of effective leadership in both church and state during this time of upheaval and only Gregory had the necessary to lead both the church and government through the storm.

Every Pope has been involved in politics whether they like it or not. Indeed you could say that we are all involved in politics at some time in our lives. It is part of the human condition to seek influence and some sort of control over what happens to us. Sometimes this will bring us into conflict with others and other times we will be in harmony with them if we share the same goals. Conflict is not always bad – it stimulates creativity and energises us to improve our lives and the world we live in. It degenerates into something evil when it is taken to extremes as happens when there is hatred and a desire for revenge. So we shouldn't be surprised at Popes being involved in politics – we are all involved in politics to some extent in our everyday lives whether we like it or not! Pope Gregory used politics for good – he used his gifts of personal charisma and powers to influence events towards a good outcome. Even
