Welcome at Christmas

There is an aspect to the preparation for Christmas that appeals to people whether they are religious or not. The tasks that are undertaken in the weeks leading up to the day itself as familiar maybe from childhood and if nothing else can take our minds off the cold and short days. During the year the Interpretative Centre at the Round

Tower in Clondalkin Village was opened. The perseverance and determination of many people made this happen. As I walked around the garden on the day of the opening I was struck by how for many centuries the Tower acted not only as a marker to indicate where Clondalkin Village was but pointing upwards towards heaven. An image came into my mind of many Christmas mornings when parishioners from the rural parts of Clondalkin made their way to Mass.

Christmas is a time of welcoming. People welcome home family and friends who live overseas, neighbours welcome neighbours for a seasonal drink. We remember our families and friends who are overseas, especially those for whom this is their first Christmas away from home. We welcome those spending their first Christmas with us here in Clondalkin and our parishioners from other lands who are now an integral part of our worshipping community. The first Christmas was a little different. There was no welcome for the couple from Nazareth who were expecting their child. Their only refuge was a place where the animals were kept, not the most healthy or hygienic place to give birth. God's chosen people and those waiting for a Messiah were not the first to welcome him. Instead it was the outsiders, the shepherds and those who travelled from afar, who greeted the baby with joy.

How will the Christ child be welcomed this Christmas? Will there be space amongst the celebrations and gift-giving to receive the gift of a child who has the power to transform and heal, to comfort and disturb? Where will we encounter the Christ who lives among us - in those who are less fortunate than ourselves? The Clondalkin I wrote about in the first paragraph has disappeared. Today there are nine Catholic Churches in the area and on Sunday 17th December the Church of the Transfiguration in Bawnogue will officially reopen after extensive repairs. All are invited to the nam Mass to mark the occasion.

December 8th is the Feast Day of Clondalkin Village Parish -

Few teachings of the Catholic Church are as misunderstood as the that of **the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary**, the holy, solemn day celebrated among

Catholics .The Immaculate Conception does not refer to the birth of Jesus, but rather the birth of

Mary to her mother, Saint Anne. To become the mother of God's son, Mary was deemed "full of

grace" at the moment of her conception, meaning she was free of sin. Another misconception people have is that Mary's Immaculate Conception was necessary to ensure that Original Sin would not be passed on to Christ. This has never been a part of the Church's teaching; rather, the feast represents Christ's saving grace operating in Mary. In other words, the Immaculate Conception was not a precondition for Christ's act of redemption but the result of that act! It is the concrete expression of God's love for Mary, who gave herself fully, completely, and without hesitation to His service.— *Make sure to wish everyone a Happy feast day!!*

Advent is a time of preparation....as always it is some four weeks in length with four candles highlighting this preparation. What or who are we preparing for? It is the Birth of the Child Jesus. Words like Waiting, Watching and Longing are repeated in the prayers and readings of the coming days.

Week 1 And what I say to you I say to all: Stay Awake!
As we watch and wait for Christmas, we can make a prayer of thanks to God each day, for our faith and the love we find and give in life.

Week 2 Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight!

Advent is a time of committing ourselves to the joyful lifetime of service....the family in one room in a hotel or a hob or on the street are our brothers and sisters....

Week 3 He sent me to bring Good News to the Poor.

The Giving Tree is a wonderful yet simple way to reach out, to share with others. How will you be Good News for a family this Christmas?

Week 4 Mary, do not be afraid, you have won God's favour. The Son of God was sent to us through Mary....and now through each of us again this Christmas Day and every day....

Practice the Art of Waiting

We live in a world of instant gratification. We hate to wait in line; wait for the fever to break for a sick child; wait while our computers & tablets "buffer;" wait to hear from the college of our choice; wait for our child to come home safely from the disco; wait behind slower runners or walkers at the 5k; waiting in traffic. We spend a fair amount of time waiting and losing our cool over it. We also spend a fair amount of time teaching our children how to wait ("No, you can't have sweets just before dinner"). So, we already know that there are benefits to waiting. So, what if we changed our thinking about waiting from an annoyance into a VIRTUE? Waiting then becomes an activity, and a pretty helpful one at that. By actively waiting, we are able to reflect more fully on what really matters during Advent. By actively waiting, we are preparing our hearts for Christ to be born anew in them. The next time you're waiting in line at the bank, shop or on the M50, take that time to be reminded that God is waiting, too. The God who loves you deeply is waiting for you to open the doors of your heart.



The Mesning behind our Advent Wresth

Set on the branches of the wreath are four candles: three purple candles and one pink candle. In

the centre of the wreath sits a white candle. Each candle represents an aspect of the spiritual preparation for the coming of the Lord.

On the first Sunday of Advent, the first purple candle is lit. This candle is typically called the "Prophecy Candle" in remembrance of the prophets, primarily Isaiah, who foretold the birth of Christ. This candle represents hope or expectation in anticipation of the coming Messiah. Each week on Sunday, an additional candle is lit. On the second Sunday of Advent, the second purple candle is lit. This candle typically represents love. Some traditions call this the "Bethlehem Candle" symbolizing Christ's manger. On the third Sunday of Advent the pink coloured candle is lit. This pink candle is customarily called the "Shepherds Candle" and it represents joy. The fourth and last purple candle, oftentimes called the "Angels Candle" represents peace and is lit on the fourth Sunday of Advent. On Christmas Eve, the white centre candle is traditionally lit. This

candle is called the "Christ Candle" and

represents the light of Christ that has

come into the world.

TMAS in Bawnogue!


Many of you are aware of the renovations that have been

Ideas for celebrating some of the Feast days throughout Advent

St. Nicholas Day - The feast of St. Nicholas is on Dec. 6th. It is a highlight of the Advent season in places like Germany. Each child puts out a shoe the night before St. Nicholas Day in the hope that the kind bishop with his mitre, staff, and bag of gifts will pay a visit. The current Santa Claus is modelled after St. Nicholas, but commercialism has tarnished the true story a bit. Many families give small gifts on both Dec. 6 and Christmas. Feast of the Immaculate Conception - Some families have the custom of decorating the Christ candle with a blue veil on December 8th, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception. On this great feast, others place a candle with a blue ribbon before a statue or picture of the Blessed Virgin, whose yes to God enabled our Lord's coming at Christmas. The candle is lit during meal times to serve as a delightful reminder of Mary's eager expectation of the Light of the World. It can also serve as a reminder to each family member to keep their own light of love burning as a preparation for Christ's coming.



St. Lucy cakes - The feast of St. Lucy, virgin and martyr, is on December 13th. This marks the opening of the Christmas season in Sweden. Her life story can be found in most saints books or online, as can the recipe for the traditional cakes. The symbolism is rich and her life story worthwhile reading.



Candle at the Window. This is one of the most well-observed of Irish Christmas traditions and has changed little over the years except in its increasing popularity. Just one candle used to be placed in a window as a sign of welcome for Mary and Joseph on Christmas Eve but it is common these days to see lit candles, usually electrically or battery powered, in all downstairs street-facing windows throughout the festive season. In some homes they are also placed in upstairs windows.



But always remember to be fire-aware & safe!!

This year we want to quiet the input a little more each week until we can hear your Word speaking to us. Please be patient with us as we try to listen for your Spirit's voice.

AT THE HEART OF THE LOGO At the heart of the logo is the family. Family members are represented in different ages and roles while walking together in communion and love, helping one another through the journey of life. **No one is excluded, no one is left behind**. Couples, elderly, single, widowed, consecrated, clergy, children, all are important members of our families and all are invited to participate.

AN INTERNATIONAL AND ECOLOGICAL EVENT The map of the world shows that families from all around the globe will come to Ireland for what will be a truly international event. While we see only a glimpse of the continents, they represent the whole world: the common home of all families, entrusted to us by God. In his encyclical letter, *Laudato Si*, Pope Francis reminds us that families have a vital role to play in caring for our common home. He reminds us that Saint Francis of Assisi described our earth itself as "like a sister with whom we share our life and a beautiful mother who opens her arms to embrace us". The World Meeting of Families will explore how families, as our first home, can help us to care for our common home.

THE CHURCH, THE FAMILY OF FAMILIES The red semicircle with the cross on the top echoes the logo of the Archdiocese of Dublin, which is the host diocese. As well as representing God's love, flowing from the cross, embracing all the families of the world, the semicircle and cross also represent the 'dome' of the Church, "a family of families". In the logo, as in real life, the Church embraces the family, protects the family and supports the family. When our families are stronger, society is stronger, and the Church is stronger.


THE CROSS The cross is the ultimate symbol of the self-sacrificing love of Jesus. Self-sacrificing love is at the very heart of marriage and family life. The rays represent the grace of the Holy Spirit, flowing from the cross and uniting our families in love. Through the Holy Spirit, Jesus dwells within our families and gives us the strength to take up our own crosses and follow him. The cross used in the logo is also a symbol of Ireland's Christian roots and history. The Papal Cross that stands in the Phoenix Park from 1979, where over one million Catholics gathered for another major occasion to welcome, listen and pray with Pope John Paul II when he visited Ireland.

THE HOLY TRINITY In The Joy of Love, Pope Francis speaks several times of marriage and the family as the "living icon" of the Most Holy Trinity. As the family, through marriage, comes together in mutual self-giving, communion and love, it reflects the mystery of the Holy Trinity and immerses itself in "the mystery from which all true love flows." The tri-spiral swirl in the logo draws from ancient Celtic imagery, to reflect this truth. These triple spirals are found on ancient stones and monuments around Ireland. As Christianity came to Ireland, the tri-spiral, began to be used as a symbol of the Holy Trinity, together with the well-known shamrock, associated with St Patrick. St. Patrick, tradition has it, used the shamrock to explain the mystery of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit united, as one family: one God and three Divine Persons, in a perfect communion of love.

I pray for all the families in our parishes this Christmas. I pray especially for all who find Christmas a lonely or sad time, in particular those who are bereaved, and those who have lost loved ones this year. I pray for all our parishioners who are ill at this time. I pray for those who are away from home, either because of emigration or other reasons. I pray for any of our parishioners who are in prison. I pray for all the children of our parishes. The Message of Christmas keeps hope alive in our hearts because it is a message of truth that tells us God-is-with-us, God is Emmanuel. I'd love to see you at our various celebrations over the Christmas period.

I pray that the presence of the Christ-Child will grace your home during this Christmas season and throughout the coming year. Wishing you every blessing. May God bless you, your Families and all who are dear to you. Fr David Halpin

Giving Plate as a Gift this Christmas

What you'll need:

- Sharpie (permenant) markers (bold or metallic colours work best)
- Round or Square white ceramic plate
- Acetone nail polish remover
- · Paper towels

Round plates seem to be best. You don't have to worry about getting the font in the middle of the plate and the inner circle of the plate makes a great guide for keeping everything centred.

Here is the full poem we suggest – Be creative & why not create your own

This Plaje shall have no owner, for it's journey never ends.

It travels in a circle of our family and friends.

It carries love from home to home for everyone to share.

The food that's placed upon it was made with love and care.

So please enjoy what's on this plaje then fill it up again.

Then pass it on and the love it holds to your family and friends.



If you make a mistake....NO WORRIES. Break out the acetone nail polish remover and put a little bit on a paper towel. Apply to the area of mistake and voila, mistake erased.

After finishing the poem on the front and the doodles turn the plate over and write "hand wash only" (& maybe "Keep Making a Difference") on the back of the plate.


After adding the message on the back of the plate you are basically finished. The last thing that you need to do is to bake the plate in the oven at 180 for 30 minutes. This will "set" the Sharpie so that it will no longer be easily removed with acetone. (Note that if you scrub hard enough and long enough you can still remove the marker with acetone! Fill plate with Cake, Biscuits, Buns or Sweets or whatever and gift it to someone you like.

Using dark colour or metallic markers works best & When you bake the plate the lighter colours tend to turn a different shade. Yellow becomes brownish, orange becomes red, and pink becomes orange.

You can't really mess this up. Your neighbour or family member or friend or co-worker will marvel at your ability to Create such a thoughtful gift,

and let it go on it's way to keep Making A Difference!


