It seems a very strange thing to say in a culture dominated by excess, addiction and superficiality. We are not the only ones who have a season of self-denial, Jews & Muslims have it too. Even our consumer culture has a streak of it in a paradoxical

way in that it encourages diets, workout, jogging and other forms of physical exercise. In our season of asceticism, we focus on prayer, fasting & alms-giving which we derive from the two great commandments; loving God & loving our neighbour. Many people go to weekday Masses during Lent and this is loving God because our attendance demands a certain effort and some of our time. It overlaps with the command to love our neighbour as ourselves which also requires us to give up some of our time, effort and material goods. All of this helps to lift us out of the clutter and stress of modern life and "Live Simply" as the slogan from Trocaire put it a few years ago. Does God really want us to be happy? I think he does but maybe that sounds a little unconvincing during Lent which can appear to be a gloomy time of year.

God leads us to happiness in the adventure of what might be called, 'Soul Building' - the work of channelling our will into conformity with his will. To do this we need periods where we reign in our untrammelled desires to focus them more clearly on that which is good for us. We have days and seasons of self-denial in order to enjoy the good things of creation even more in our seasons of celebration. The English writer, Helaire Belloc, wrote that where ever the catholic sun doth shine, there is laughter, beer & good red wine. His friend G. K. Chesterton tempered that by saying, "We give thanks to God for beer and wine and not drinking too much of them!"

Self-denial and self-mastery build our souls and happiness is found in the building. So, we pray during this Lent that we will continue with our practices of Prayer, Fasting & Charity as we ask the Lord to help us persevere in our looking forward to the great celebration of Easter! Fr. Padraig

gave us lumps in out throats and tears for some. Margaret, robbed her parents bank account and credit card and blew thousands of Euro over 5 years travelling, on the drugs and eventually she hit rock bottom. She said " I have had it, I am going home to my family and friends". On the train into Heuston Margaret's anguish and trepidation left her in a mist of fear, interminable questioning, emotional paralysis and vulnerability. Alone in the crowds on the platform, bottomed out, she said " They didn't come to meet me."

Then through a blind haze, from far away she heard cries of "Margaret, Margaret". Still in a daze, Margaret saw her mother's beaming face and was wrapped up in a deep hug and the two sets of tears came and all of us in the Church had a moment in time, healing emotion and the tears trickled down. Then Margaret was dumbstruck to be brought into a cracker of a welcome home party. She thought " why did I leave this so long" How did all this come together. The narration was superb, the plot fast moving, the mime timeless and misty.

The deserved warm applause which filled the church said it all. All was set against and within the background of Frank's beautiful Slate which made real the Lenten Theme "Wiping The Slate Clean."

The stark Lenten Altar and banner "Just Come Home " also set the tone. Thanks to all in Environmental Ministry who helped. The word "shamrock" comes from the Gaelic word "seamrog" (In irish, it means "summer plant") meaning "trefoil" (three leafed) or "little clover". The shamrock as symbol of Ireland and St. Patrick's Day is partly due to the natural abundance of clover plants in the country,

but largely due to its strong association with Christianity. Legend says that St. Patrick used the shamrock to visually illustrate the concept of the Trinity (the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit). In Christianity, God is three persons, but it's not the same as three gods!

People found this hard to understand. So, St. Patrick reflected a moment and then, stooping down, he plucked a leaf from the shamrock and held it before them, then asked them to behold the living example of the "Three-in-One." The simple beauty of this explanation convinced these sceptics, and from that day

the shamrock has been revered throughout Ireland. A four-leaf clover has always been considered a symbol of good luck in Irish culture. According to legend, the leaves of a four-leaf clover represent hope, faith, and love, and God added

another leaf for luck!
