MARTHA AND MARY

To- day's Gospel is the story of two sisters, two dimensions of life, two understandings of hospitality and a valuable lesson from Jesus about getting the balance right.

Martha and her sister Mary were two different characters and special friends of Jesus. Martha was not any less spiritual than Mary. After all, it was she who welcomed Jesus into her home. However, welcoming Jesus is not enough. His

presence demands our presence. Martha rushed around, preparing and serving a meal while Mary sat at the feet of Jesus listening with rapt attention to every word he spoke. Martha had things to do and complaints to make. She was "worried and distracted by many things". She had the strengths and weaknesses of an active person. Mary had those of a contemplative person. She was quiet and reflective. She had thoughts to think and truths to ponder. She was drawn to a presence that put everything else in perspective. Each made up for the unbalance in the other and Jesus loved them both.

There is a Martha and a Mary within each of us: a part that longs for a nearer presence of God; and a part that always finds something else that requires our more urgent attention. Jesus' words to Martha in her frantic busyness must influence the choice we make each day. Time spent with him is "the one thing needed" and it must "not be taken away".

Time spent with our God is one of the best ways to build up a relationship. Daily time spent in prayer begins to grow from a particular time and place to a new way of being in this world. It is not possible to experience sitting at the feet of Jesus each day and not be changed, just as it is not possible to spend hours sunbathing and not be tanned.


To the new music ministry group which made their debut at the 6.30pm vigil Mass yesterday evening (Saturday 20th) in Sruleen.

Some scripture scholars remark that today's Gospel is less about work versus prayer and more about breaking boundaries. They understand that sitting at Jesus' feet or, listening to any rabbi was reserved for men only. They in turn would become teachers of faith. But here,

Mary has stepped out of the traditional role when she should be in the women's quarters and Jesus fully approves, inviting Martha to do the same.

If we were to ask Jesus which of these two things we need more of Mary's reflectiveness or Martha's activism ~

He would probably say "Yes".





On Wednesday 10th, (too late for inclusion in last week's newsletter), despite a torrential downpour, the community of Clondalkin came out in droves to express its anger and dismay at the decision to close the Jigsaw Clondalkin service (Youth Mental Health) in North Clondalkin by April 2020 and move to new premises in Tallaght Village. Neither the community nor the other services in the area were consulted in the making of this decision. The Clondalkin Jigsaw hub was opened by Minister Frances Fitzgerald in 2012. Since then the Jigsaw Clondalkin hub, in the grounds of Neilstown Church, has become a safe place for young people to meet and receive support. As a valued service it has done much to reduce the stigma surrounding youth mental health and had demonstrated significant success in engaging with young people from the disadvantaged areas of Clondalkin. The walk, organised by the Community and supported by Community Action on Suicide (CAS), saw people of all ages and backgrounds join in solidarity to send a clear message to both the Minister and management of Jigsaw, "Please reverse or at least put this decision back on the table and include the local community in all decisions that affect us and our young people so profoundly." Although Jigsaw have suggested that a satellite service will be offered in Clondalkin, to date they have not been able to clarify what this model will look like or how this will be delivered locally. Reducing a service from a 5 day week to a satellite service will not meet the needs of young people in the Clondalkin / Lucan area. CAS, the local services and the community are still strongly encouraging young people in need to not think twice about contacting Jigsaw for support but they will continue to lobby government, councillors, etc. to keep the service open and to raise the REAL STORY of the consequences of this decision. They have already begun to look at ways to support young people from the area in every way possible to overcome the inaccessibility created by this decision and move, and are exploring alternate, bespoke, loyal & local services that will replace Jigsaw to provide a better service with less gaps, responding to the actual needs of our local community. #saveourjigsaw #Youthmentalhealthmatters #timetotalk

"A Mary Heart in a Martha World."

A recent survey reported the average father works 49 hours a week ... and his wife, if she has a full time job, just a few hours less. Around those 49 hours, there's soccer practice, cub scouts, the school play, parent teacher meetings, the project in your brief case that you have to get done for work the next morning, here - Hope you had a great the toilet that's broken, homework to correct, bills to pay, dinner to cook, and the dog to walk. Little wonder that according to one poll 83% of people want more time to spend with their families – and even more want more time just to spend with themselves. And in the middle of that kind of frenzy - a frenzy that probably had its own variations in first century Palestine — we hear Jesus say: "You are anxious and worried about many things." we're pulled in so many directions, how do we know which way to go? The challenge is: "To have a Mary heart in a Martha world."

About 400 years ago, in France, there was a young man Nicholas Herman, who entered a Carmelite monastery after spending some years as a soldier. He took the name "Brother Lawrence." He was assigned to kitchen duty. He hated it. But in the kitchen, amid all the noise and frenzy, he found a way to God. He later wrote down some of his thoughts in letters that were collected in a little book, "The Practice of the Presence of God," that has become a spiritual classic. Br Lawrence wrote that even in the noise of the kitchen, he possessed God as if he were praying before the Blessed Sacrament.

His secret was simple: he spent every moment reminding himself of the nearness of God, the intimacy that God shares with us. It's an idea that was captured centuries later on a famous engraving. "Bidden or not bidden," it says, "God is present." Whether you realize it or not, God is with you. Understanding that, Brother Lawrence made even mundane

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
