A priest, a minister and a rabbi were in a pub discussing the best positions for prayer. There was a mountain climber sitting nearby. "Kneeling is definitely the best way to pray," says the priest. "No," the minister says, "I get the best results standing with my hands outstretched to Heaven." "You're both wrong," the rabbi says. "The most effective prayer position is lying prostrate on the floor." The mountain climber,

overhearing the conversation, could contain himself no longer. "Hey, lads," he interrupted, "The best praying I ever did was when I was hanging upside down from a rope on the edge of a sheer cliff at 1,000 feet!" Some times we can get caught up what's and why's of praying rather than the prayer!

In the Gospel this morning, we hear the disciples asking Jesus the same sort of question we all ask – how should we pray? You would think that it would come naturally for them? After all, they've been with Jesus, Himself. They've seen Him, followed him and watched Him. But they, too, have doubts about how they are supposed to pray. So Jesus gives them a prayer - The Our Father. I remember when I was younger a teacher explaining the Our Father as having all the 4 essential prayers in it - **Please**, **Thanks, Oops** and **Wow**.

Whether we're young or old we all use the **Please prayer** - *Please help me pass the test. Please help me get job. Please help my sister to get better.* 

Then, because it's not polite to always ask for stuff there's the **Thanks prayer** - Thanks for helping me pass the test. Thanks for the raise I got. Thanks that I woke up this morning.

Then there's the **Oops prayer**. "Oops" is about acknowledging that we've failed in some way, whether big or small. So we ask for God's forgiveness - *Oops. I said something hurtful about a friend. Oops. I didn't do what I promised. Oops. I need forgiveness.* 

The **Wow prayer** is one we don't think of often enough. Maybe because we've lost our childlike ability to be amazed at the wonderfulness of God's creation around us or we're too busy to notice or have our breath taken away by the wonders that surround us - *Beautiful sunsets, I love you Grandad from a grandchild, the beauty of nature, the selfless giving and thoughtfulness of some people, the unexpected good turn or hug, or ... There are so many wows all around us, if we only keep our eyes open for them.* 

What is important is that we pray and that our prayer is a relationship. An active relationship of love and support. God understands whatever the words, whatever the form, whatever the language, Spoken aloud, or in the silence of our hearts. God knows. I'd ask you this week to keep my sister Sheila in your prayers. Thanks.



On the 4th October 1957 in our neighbours garden, my father, our neighbour (a bank manager), and his gardener were looking skyward to see Sputnik 1, a polished metal sphere with 4 radio antennas whose inclination and duration in space ensured that it orbited the entire inhabited earth. To me 7yr old, the animated adult

discussion left me curious and definitive in equal measure that the Russians had taken over command of our airspace The Russians covered the sphere in a highly polished reflective metal to leave all the world able to see it. The radio signals could be received by any amateur listening device. Looking out my bedroom window at the stars that night, not in my wildest childish dreams could I have foreseen that on 10th July 1970 on the boardwalk Atlantic City New Jersey (a mere 13 yrs. hence, at 19 yrs. of age on A JI working visa ) that I would be sitting alone in The Apollo 11 Command Module, Columbia. Looking around the Command Module and out the windows across the huge seascape that self same 7 yr. old of 1957 was absolutely awed. It transpires that The Apollo 11 Command Module toured America for 1 YR. Staying a week in each state Capital.

Buzz Aldrin (1930 - present) was born in New Jersey so the visit to Atlantic City would have been very special for him. In late 1970 The Command Module was stored in The Smithsonian and has been stored there for the past 50 yrs. Its going on tour again! Eddie

## Monday Club 22nd July 219

Today 23 of us from the Monday Club went on our summer outing to Avoca and Glendalough. Our very friendly helpful and pleasant driver was PJ Browne. PJ is always very punctual and looks after us very well from helping us on and off the bus and booking tables in restaurants for us.

An all-rounder in every way. Thank You PJ. As Tina Turner says in her song "Simply the Best." A "Big Thank You" to Sean Browne who supplied us with bottles of water & bananas to keep us cool and hydrated and fed on our travels. Sean is always very caring and giving to us with cakes etc and music when he can.

Our first stop was in Avoca Woollen Mills where we had our first break. There we enjoyed our tea/coffee and cakes. We had a look in their shop at the clothes and other items.

We finished our time there with a tour of the museum and a visit to the weavers who were busy weaving the cloths. The mill itself was founded in 1723 as a co-operative by local farmers. The wool was spun and woven for clothing for the local miners.

In 1926 the three Wynn sisters Veronica, Emily and Winifred took over the mills and introduced colours like reds, greens and yellows to the weaving using natural dyes from the plants and materials around them. They built up a thriving business selling tweed all over the world. Today they are recognized as Avoca's signature hues.

They exported tweeds to some of the famous couture houses of Europe, America and Canada, and royalty. For example the making of waistcoats for King George IV and baby blankets for the children of Queen Elizabeth II. They even had their own coinage called "Cronbane".

The sisters lived at Tigroney House and continued their work teaching children embroidery and soft toy making until their deaths in the 1960s. Materials are not exported now. They are sold only in the Avoca shops in Ireland. Thanks to Sandra who brought us around the factory and explained what goes on in the different departments.

We then went to Glendalough and visited the Cathedral and the priests' house, followed by a visit to the Heather Restaurant where we all enjoyed a lovely meal.

We all had a great relaxed enjoyable day and the weather was in our favour too, thank God.

We will be back in the club again on Monday 5 August (I know it's Bank Holiday). Until then take care. Kathleen R.


