

Gaelic football teams successes. It is indeed a remarkable achievement for both teams. However, within a day or so we had a couple of unexpected deaths which reminds us that there is indeed something more important than sporting success. 

keep us in plenty supply for conversation topics for some time. Eddie sent us this photo where he joined with revellers in the Laurels last Saturday.


Unfortunately we don't have a photo of the ladies' football. Congratulations to both teams! You kept us entertained and on the edge of our chairs.


Activ 8
