THE THANKFUL LEPER

o-day's Gospel story is one of healing, faith and gratitude. It begins with Jesus travelling from Galilee to Jerusalem on the border of a racially mixed area where he meets a group of lepers just outside a village. It was not unusual to meet a group of lepers outside a village as they were regarded by society as unclean and untouchable. Standing at a distance they call out with a loud voice to Jesus not for healing but for pity. Jesus tells them to go and show themselves to the priests. In the going, all realised they were cured of their leprosy but only one turned back to say "thank you" to Jesus. This man was a non Jew, a foreigner.

There is more at stake here than mere healing. All ten lepers obeyed in faith the command of Jesus and were healed but only one saw, noticed and was aware that he was healed and that made all the difference. Because he saw what had happened to him, he recognised Jesus as his healer. Because he was aware that he had something to be thankful for he fell on his face at Jesus' feet and praised God with a loud voice. He was not just healed of leprosy, he was made whole, restored to his family and society and drawn into a faith relationship with God. In one word, he was saved. Jesus confirmed this by saying, "Go your way, your faith has made you well"

There are several parallels between this leper's story and the story of Naaman, the leper, in the first reading. Both were foreigners who were healed of leprosy. Both were ordered to perform an action before healing takes place. The healing occurred only after they obeyed the order. Both returned to praise God. Both were sent home in peace.

The lesson we can learn from the readings is that God works his power through the simplest of ways. We play our part when we cooperate and give thanks.




Cardinal John Newman will be canonised in a ceremony in St Peter's Square in Vatican City today, 13 October, almost 130 years after he died. He will be the first English person born since the 17th century to be declared a saint by the Catholic church. Cardinal Newman (1801-1890)



was ordained as a Church of England priest and soon became the leader of the Oxford Movement.

After a succession of clashes with Anglican bishops made him a virtual outcast from the Church of England, he joined the Catholic Church at the age of 44 and was ordained a Catholic priest in 1846. In 1851 Newman came to Ireland at the invitation of Paul Cullen, Archbishop of Dublin to be the rector of the Catholic University; he was rector until 1858. Originally located at St. Stephen's Green in Dublin, it later became University College Dublin. Pope Leo XIII made him a cardinal in 1879 while respecting his wishes not to be ordained a bishop. A theologian and poet, he died in 1890 When he died at the age of 89, more than 15,000 people lined the streets of Birmingham for his funeral and his sainthood cause was opened in 1958. Pope Benedict XVI beatified him in Birmingham, England, in 2010.

Setting the Record Straight

"Rev. Fr John Moore was not our first Parish Priest, though he was probably the first who served the parish from the present Church of the Immaculate Conception and St Killian. It



was opened in 1862. As published in Padraig Murphy: A History of Clondalkin Catholic Parish 630-2000 AD, Dublin Diocesan records indicate that Rev Fr Oliver Doyle was the first PP of Clondalkin parish, serving in that capacity from 1697 to 1704. Fr Moore was a curate in our parish before he became our seventh PP, from 1855 to 1893. St Killian's was our previous parish church (at the time, referred to by authorities at the time as a "chapel"). It was situated on Monastery Road where the Monastery Shopping Centre is in Clondalkin village. The ornamental archway at the New Road entrance was erected in 1890 by parishioners, not in Fr Moore's memory, but to celebrate his Golden Jubilee. His likeness is sculpted on it. Fr Moore died on 4th April 1893 and Rev. Fr James Baxter became his successor as Parish Priest of Clondalkin."
