Dormant Faith

Recently I came across some State Saving Certificates that I invested in with some of the presents I received at the time of my Confirmation in 1978. I had put them safely away and despite recent annual reminders from An Post that these certificates had become dormant I hadn't bother going through the process of completing the lost and stolen form in order to redeem them.

You maybe wondering where is he going with this train of thought? Today is the first week of Advent, the beginning of the new liturgical year. Advent is sometimes described as a mini Lent, a time of preparation for the feast of the Nativity. In the time since my confirmation forty years ago the weeks leading to Christmas have become so commercialised that it is unrecognisable from my childhood.

I could be very pedantic and advise people not to say Happy Christmas just yet, but I realise that since Christmas advertisements have been aired since the end of September, I'm swimming against the tide. A challenge for us could be to encourage those whose faith maybe dormant and a chance encounter or a kind word from us could re-ignite their faith. During this Advent could we make some time for prayer and reflection, to think of those less fortunate than ourselves and in a practical way to support those in need at this time of the year. The Annual indoor collection for the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul takes place during all Masses the weekend of December 7th and 8th is one such opportunity.

Two further dates for your diary, on Monday 16th December Clondalkin Youth Band will be leading us with their Advent Carol Service and the Penance Service is on Thursday 19th at 7.30pm in the Village Church.

Happy Advent !! - By the way the eight pounds I invested in 1978 matured to seventy-five euro which I collected during the week. Think of all the return on investment we might achieve in restoring a dormant faith in someone.

'Advent' means 'coming'. Using the Advent Wreath to count the weeks before Christmas almost certainly originated in ancient harvest festivals of northern Europe. Evergreen branches were draped as decoration and wound around wagon wheels brought inside for the winter. These year end celebrations were also marked by feasting and the lighting of lamps against the growing darkness.

Early Christians adapted these traditions to fit their celebration of the birth of Christ.

The Advent wreath stands in our midst as symbol of Christ who comes to save us.

The growing light of the Advent Wreath is a symbol of Christ who shatters the darkness of sin and death. Each week as the light grows stronger, we grow stronger too in our reverence for and commitment to Christ. The growing light helps us recognise Christ, not only in the historical event we celebrate at Christmas, but in our lives today and in the hope we carry as we prepare for the coming fullness of God's reign. Evergreen branches also symbolise Christ. As evergreens stand firm against the barren winter, Christ stands firm against the barrenness of sin and death, beckoning us to eternal life. The circular shape of the wreath reminds us that all is complete in Christ and that all is brought to perfect union in him.

Today we light the 1st purple candle - The Prophets' Candle, symbolising hope.
