Firstly, may I wish all our readers whether reading the paper or the online edition a very happy and peaceful Christmas. As always we welcome those far from home and for whom Clondalkin is their new place of residence. We think of those from Clondalkin, who are living overseas away from the familiar sights, sounds and rhythm of the Christmas season. We are mindful of members of the Defence Forces and An Garda Siochana serving overseas on peace keeping missions.

We also think of those spending Christmas in hospital, hospice or in prison. I found myself at a loose end in Parnell Square on Monday afternoon and passed by the Dominican shop which for sixty three years has hosted the Moving Crib and is open until Sunday 5th January. Last year over 23,000 visited the Crib. Despite spending all but one of my fifty four years living in Ireland I never paid the crib a visit. It was very advanced for its time and is a joy to visit. I would recommend a visit (admission is free) and the thirteen bus stops nearby.

There can be a danger of reducing Christmas into a saccharine event about a baby born in a stable. Fr. Steve Grunow, from World on Fire, wrote "We should all be in wonder about the mysterious revelation of Christ's Incarnation, not as a sentimental event that is to be situated in a fantasia on winter themes, but as an event incomparably and inescapably important all year round and into eternity." He cites the haunting Appalachian carol, I Wonder as I Wander:

> I wonder as I wander, Out under the sky Why Jesus our Saviour, Did come for to die For poor ordinary people, Like you and like I I wonder as I wander out under the sky. If Jesus had wanted for any old thing a star in the sky or a bird on the wing for all of God's angels in heaven for to sing He surely could have had it, for he is their King.

How can we repay God for such generosity? Can we ever do so? Maybe not, however, we can try and two recent events illustrate this. Almost €11,000 was donated by churchgoers from our three churches to the annual collection to the Vincent De Paul Society and last Monday following the annual carol service led by Clondalkin Youth Band and Knockmitten Youth Choir we collected over €2,400 for the Capuchin Day Centre. This 'Christmas' generosity makes a difference all year round.

May you and yours have a peaceful Christmas








If I decorate my house perfectly with plaid bows, strands of twinkling lights and shiny tinsel, but do not show love to my family or friends, I'm just another decorator. If I slave away in the kitchen, baking dozens of Christmas cookies, preparing gourmet meals and arranging a beautifully adorned table at mealtime, but do not show love to my family and friends, I'm just another cook. If I work at the soup kitchen, carol sing in the nursing home and give all that I have to charity, but do not show love to my family and friends, it profits me nothing. If I trim the Christmas tree with shimmering angels and sparkling snowflakes, if I attend a myriad of holiday parties and sing carols with

the choir but do not focus on Christ, I have missed the point. Love stops the cooking to hug the child. Love sets aside the decorating to help another in need. Love notices and reaches out to support a friend in difficulty. Love is kind, even though harried and tired. Love doesn't envy another's home that has coordinated Christmas china and

table linens. Love doesn't expect or demand. Love doesn't vell at the kids to get out of the way. Love doesn't cry for attention. Love doesn't give only to those who are able to give in return but rejoices in giving to those who can't.

Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails. Video games will break, gold necklaces will be lost, golf clubs will rust, designer clothe will wear out, but giving the gift of LOVE will endure forever.

The meaning behind our -"O" Antiphons

December 17 marks the beginning of the "O" Antiphons, the seven jewels of our liturgy, dating back to the fourth century, one for each day until Christmas Eve. These antiphons address Christ with seven magnificent Messianic titles, based on the Old Testament prophecies. The antiphons beg God with mounting impatience to come and save His people. The order of the antiphons climb climatically through our history of Redemption. In the first, (O Sapientia), O Wisdom - we take a backward flight into the recesses of eternity to address Wisdom, the Word of God.

In the second, (O Adonai), O House of Israel- we have leaped from eternity to the time of Moses and the Law of Moses (about 1400 B.C.).

In the third, (O Radix Jesse), O Root of Jesse - we have come to the time when God was preparing the line of David (about 1100 B.C.).

In the fourth, (O Clavis David), O Key of David - we have come to the year 1000.

In the fifth, (O Oriens) O Rising Dawn- we see that the line of David is elevated so that the peoples may look on a rising star in the east, and hence in the sixth, (O Rex Gentium), O King - we know that He is king of all the world.

On Christmas Eve, and before coming to the town limits of Bethlehem, we salute Him with the last Great O, O Emmanuel, God-with-us

The antiphons are part of the evening prayer of the Divine Office, the antiphon before and after the Magnificat. They are also the alleluia verse before the Gospel at Mass. They have been prayed since the 4th Century. They are our ancient prayer of preparation for Christmas.

The Meaning behind our Advent Wreath

As all candles are lit on Christmas Eve

Set on the branches of the wreath are four candles: three purple candles and one pink candle. In the centre of the wreath sits a white candle. Each candle represents an aspect of the spiritual preparation for the coming of the Lord.

On the first Sunday of Advent, the first purple candle was lit. This candle is typically called the "Prophecy Candle" in remembrance of the prophets, primarily Isaiah, who foretold the birth of Christ. This candle represents hope or expectation in anticipation of the coming Messiah. Each week on Sunday, an additional candle was lit. On the second Sunday of Advent, the second purple candle is lit. This candle typically represents love. Some traditions call this the "Bethlehem Candle" symbolizing Christ's manger. On the third Sunday of Advent the pink coloured candle was lit. This pink candle is customarily called the "Shepherds Candle" and it represents joy. The fourth and last purple candle,

oftentimes called the "Angels Candle" represents peace and was lit on the fourth Sunday of Advent. On Christmas Eve, the white centre candle is traditionally lit. This candle is called the "Christ Candle" and represents the light of Christ that has

come into the world.

The song, "The Twelve Days of Christmas" is an English Christmas carol. From 1558 until 1829, Catholics in England were not permitted to practice their faith openly. The carol was written as a catechism song for young Catholics. It has two levels of meaning: the surface meaning plus a hidden meaning known only to members of the Church. Each element in the carol has a code word for a religious reality which the children could remember. The "True Love" one hears in the song is not a smitten boy or girlfriend but Jesus Christ, because truly Love was born on Christmas Day. The partridge in the pear tree also represents Him because that bird is willing to sacrifice its life if necessary to protect its young by

feigning injury to draw away predators. The two turtle doves were the Old and New Testaments, The three French hens stood for faith, hope, and love. *The four calling birds* were the four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. The five golden rings represented the first five books of the Old Testament, which describe creation and the great love of God in sending a Saviour. The *six geese a-laying* stood for the six days of creation. *Seven swans* a-swimming represented the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit - Prophesy, Serving, Teaching, Exhortation, Contribution, Leadership, and Mercy. The eight maids a-milking were the eight Beatitudes. Nine ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit - Charity, Joy, Peace, Patience, Goodness [Kindness], Mildness, Fidelity,

Modesty, Continency. The ten lords a-leaping were the Ten Commandments. The *eleven pipers piping* stood for the eleven faithful Apostles. *The twelve drummers*

drumming symbolized the twelve points of belief in The Apostles' Creed. So, how many presents are there altogether in the song 12 Days of Christmas?


