What a week of change in government, in politics and in the weather. The phrase "seismic shift" has been almost played out and interesting times lie ahead. In the midst of this today's gospel has a very powerful message. Jesus begins by telling his disciples that his purpose is not to abolish the law or to criticize what the prophets proclaimed and taught. Jesus' intent is to fulfil the law. Jesus also emphasizes that keeping the commandments is essential. But Jesus was



often attacked and criticised for not following the law? So what law is Jesus asking us to follow? Jesus followed most of the Jewish laws and customs. However, when it came to people in need of love and compassion, Jesus lived by the law of God! Yes, all the commandments are important and necessary. For Jesus, the first two commandments are the foundation for the other eight commandments: love of God and love of neighbour. Love should come before all else! What was important above all else was love. So apt in this Valentine's week. Knowing that we are loved, we were created in love and that we were called to be that love for others is the basis of our faith and the foundation for our hope. Love then is the one thing above all others and love frees. When the law of the land or the church neglects, forgets, enslaves or oppresses then it becomes the god. When the law serves the few, focus' on the self and forgets the 'other' it is not God's law. How often in life do we simply go through the motions of being Christian? Sitting in Mass on Sundays, saying a quick prayer at night before falling asleep or when we need something, giving up sweets or Facebook for Lent without really thinking about what Lent is all about. Jesus challenges us all to enter more fully into God's law of love, compassion, forgiveness and inclusion. Take a bit of time for yourself this week. In the midst of all this change and uncertainty to ask yourself - What is it that God is actually calling me to in life? What does following God's laws, God's commandments really mean to me, and how does it change my life? Does the practice of our community of faith mirror and witness to that love in our community?

We should not simply go through the motions of Christianity. Rather, as Jesus calls us to do, we must follow and enter fully into God's commandments and Be Love for others. As St Mother Theresa said, "The world is full of good people but if you can't find one, then be one". If you can not find a person of love, then go be that person. If you can not find a person of hope, then go be that person. Why? Because that's who we are and who we are called to be. ## "BLESSED ARE THEY WHO FOLLOW THE LAW OF THE LORD!"

Today is the 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time, and through the Scripture Readings of today, God calls us to a radical way of living. We are called to be more than just moral: God calls us to be virtuous..

"A story is told about Fiorello LaGuardia, who, when he was mayor of New York City, during the worst days of the Great Depression and all of WWII, was called by adoring New Yorkers 'the Little Flower' because he was only five foot four and always wore a carnation in his lapel. He was a colourful character who used to ride the New York City fire trucks, raid speakeasies with the police department, take entire orphanages to baseball games,

whenever the New York newspapers were on strike, he and would go on the radio and read the Sunday funnies to the kids. One bitterly cold night in January of 1935, the mayor turned up at a night court that served the poorest ward of the city. LaGuardia dismissed the judge for the evening and took over the bench himself. Within a few minutes, a tattered old woman was brought before him, charged with stealing a loaf of bread. She told La Guardia that her daughter's husband had deserted her, her daughter was sick, and her two grandchildren were starving. But the shopkeeper, from whom the bread was stolen, refused to drop the charges. "It's a real bad neighbourhood, your Honour." the man told the mayor. "She's got to be punished to teach other people around here a lesson." LaGuardia sighed. He turned to the woman and said "I've got to punish you. The law makes no exceptions-ten dollars or ten days in jail." But even as he pronounced sentence, the mayor was already reaching into his pocket. He extracted a bill and tossed it into his famous sombrero saying: "Here is the ten dollar fine which I now remit; and furthermore, I am going to fine everyone in this courtroom fifty cents for living in a town where a person has to steal bread so that her grandchildren can eat. Mr. Bailiff, collect the fines and give them to the defendant."

So the following day the New York City newspapers reported that \$47.50 was turned over to a bewildered old lady who had stolen a loaf of bread to feed her starving grandchildren, fifty cents of that amount being contributed by the red-faced grocery store owner, while some seventy petty criminals, people with traffic violations, and New York City policemen, each of whom had just paid fifty cents for the privilege of doing so, gave the mayor a standing ovation. In this story we see how the mayor of New York City maintained and defended the laws under his jurisdiction, not by merely keeping them himself, but much more than that by showing respect, even to the accused and being compassionate to her and helping her out at the same time.

Justice without mercy would be dark, cruel, more like injustice than justice. But mercy without justice would be like salve on a sore which should be cleansed with the red-hot iron; if the salve is applied before the wound is cleansed it only makes it smart, and does not heal it" Catherine of Siena
