TWO FOR THE PRICE OF ONE

Many of the people I encounter in the course of my Priestly ministry with whom I share my name spell it with an E. Indeed, I gather Damien is many times more popular than my own spelling Damian. Perhaps the most famous Damien is Father Damien, Saint Damien of Molokai. Born in Belgium in 1840, he was a member of the Congregation of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary, a missionary religious institute who care for our neighbouring parish of Sruleen. He won recognition for his ministry, which he led from 1873 until his death in 1889, in the Kingdom of Hawaii for people with leprosy (also known as Hansen's disease), who were required to live under government -required medical quarantine in a settlement on the Kalaupapa Peninsula of Moloka.

During this time, he taught the Catholic faith to the people of Hawaii. Father Damien also cared for the patients himself and established

leadership within the community to build houses, schools, roads, hospitals, and churches. He dressed residents' ulcers, built a reservoir, made coffins, dug graves, shared pipes, and ate poi from his hands with them, providing both medical and

emotional support.

After eleven years caring for the physical, spiritual, and emotional needs of those in the leper colony, Father Damien realized he had also contracted leprosy when he was scalded by hot water and felt no pain. He continued with his work despite the infection but finally succumbed to the disease on 15 April 1889.

Last month I got an opportunity to visit the peninsula of Kalaupapa along with my

Mother. We flew on a ten-seater plane from Honolulu and the clouds were so dense we had to have a second attempt at landing. I've included a photograph of one of the many graveyards on Kalaupapa where almost eight thousand lepers were buried. I made a discovery that a second person who ministered on the island of whom I had never heard of was Sister Marianne Cope. She was a German-born American religious sister who was a member of the Sisters of St Francis of Syracuse, New York, the same order as Sister Carmel Earls in Neilstown. She accepted an invitation from the authorities to come to Kalaupapa to look after the girls and women who had been forcibly exiled on the peninsula. She worked along side Fr. Damien and indeed was with him at his death.



These two extraordinary people left their home countries, ministered where they had least expected and gave of their all to the end. They were and are two witnesses to our faith. On Wednesday we can wear our ashes to mark the start of Lent and in doing so we too can give witness that our faith is something important to us.

Wednesday next, 26th February, ASH WEDNESDAY, begins the Season of Lent and our preparation for EASTER.

Masses are at 7.30am, 10am and 7.30pm Ashes, blessed and made from the previous year's burned palms, will be used to mark the foreheads of

the faithful. Blessed ashes will be available to be taken away for the sick and housebound.

The name 'Day of Ashes' comes from "Dies Cinerum" in the Roman Missal and is found in the earliest existing copies of the Gregorian Sacramentary. The concept originated by the Roman Catholics somewhere in the 6th century. Though the exact origin of the day is not clear, the custom of marking the head with ashes on this Day is said to have originated during the papacy of Gregory the Great (590-604).

Long was one of the best German athletes and a favourite of Adolf Hitler. During the long-jump trial, he broke several Olympic records. The only other person who could beat him was Jesse Owens. Hitler hated the black athlete and moved out of the pavilion when Jesse recorded



his trial. Jesse was upset with the treatment of Hitler. He fouled his first trial and failed to qualify in the second trial. There was only one last chance to redeem himself.
