

Over fifty five years ago Karl Rahner once famously said,

"The Christian of the future will be a mystic or ... will not exist at all."

What a mystical moment on the mountain that must have been for Peter, James and John. Moments of an

encounter with God who was, is and always will be a loving God throughout generations. God the one longing for a covenant with ordinary people who trust, follow, pray and take risks.

Any mountain story in the bible is seen as a place where people experience God (eg. Moses went up the mountain to be with God. One the mountain Moses was given the Ten Commandments).

Out of the three disciples that Jesus led up the mountain Peter in particular had been on "a road" – after finally recognising that Jesus is Christ, the Son of the living God (Mt 16:16) he now encounters Jesus in a deeper way. You may know that Peter is one of my favourite characters in the bible. A normal guy, called by Jesus while doing his day to day job. On the one hand he was a guy that jumps for every opportunity to be with Jesus, to prove to Jesus he is the one to trust and on the other hand Peter is the one that doubted, while walking on water. He was the one that was not just happy for his feet to be washed by Jesus and probably when he thought it could not get more difficult – he denied Jesus not once - but three times. And with all this in mind he was the one who was asked to be the first Pope – Peter, although imperfect. Why? Because even with Peter's broken-ness Jesus saw his potential in leading the community of followers of Jesus Christ.

On Ash Wednesday some parishioners took on a challenge of a book club. The group is reading a book by Gerard Gallagher, called *Return to Me with All your Heart* and as one who is committed to read, reflect and pray with this wonderful book I was struck by Ash Wednesday's reflection *"There will be times when we might identify with some of the supporter of Jesus and some of those who denied Jesus took."* (page 9).

In our own way we all can be Peter. We are all followers and at the same time we deny Jesus. We are human like Peter. Who are you going to be in the week ahead? How do people know you are a follower of Christ? When do you deny Jesus? If you have ever had a mountain experience like Peter, James and John, you know you cannot stay on the mountain side in awe – you need to come down and face reality of being a follower.
