on? They knew the deal. The landowner told them about this. Should they not be happy to have been picked but the generous landowner that offered them all a wage? So after all is it unfair or not?

Parable are there to teach us about God's Loves, Mercy, Compassion, Forgiveness, Grace.

As Dr Kieran J. O'Mahony OSA writes in his weekly reflections on Scripture:

"The forty-two parables in the Gospels are designed to take us up short and make us think again."

This parable is telling us about God's Grace. Not just the one that has always done the right thing, followed all the rules, always being that good person he/

Maybe I joined the "vineyard" at a later stage – at lunchtime or maybe an hour before dawn and personally I am glad we are all loved in the same way – no different between you and me – we can always start again. The objective of our work for God should not be a reward, but the one for whom we are working. Because the true meaning of God's work should be the words of Saint Paul, who says in his letter that "For me to live - is Christ, and to die - is to gain".


