



I remember being in secondary school when I first truly reflected on today's Gospel passage. I was struck by how stern of a command it was, and I remember specifically being afraid that throughout my life I might forget the needy and consequently be condemned for it. It frightened me, especially because the local parish priest was a well practiced preacher who drove the message of fear and judgement home. As I have gotten older, this Gospel does not scare me as it once did because I see

that it is a call to love and not to condemnation. God does not operate on fear: Jesus doesn't want us to care for the needy because He has scared us into it; He wants us to do it to show that we love Him by loving them.

It is a passage that should challenge us: do we care for the poor as we ought? Are we doing enough individually, as a community and as a society both 1) to provide charity and 2) to work for justice for those in need? Saint Mother Teresa, the Angel of the Slums, once mentioned that the greatest poverty is loneliness. In this light, perhaps our whole understanding of who the poor are should be challenged? In addition to providing for the needs of those in physical want, do we work to bring aid to those in mental, emotional, or spiritual need? More so in the times that we are in - who are the forgotten and the 'over-looked'? If this is the case (and I believe it is), I am convinced that the poor are not some far off concept away from our own comfortable homes, careers, and lifestyles: instead, the poor, those in need, are all around us: our classmates, co-workers, neighbours, friends, and family members.

Firstly we have to recognise our own poverty, our own need for God, forgiveness and love. This should not turn us in ourselves but should lead us, drive us out to alleviate the poverty

of others. In these times between the big things we can not do and the small things we refuse to do the danger is that we do nothing – and that danger is real. Apathy, finger-pointing and excuses for inactivity seem to be the biggest plague. The Gospel today makes it clear that we are called to notice, to respond, to act, to serve – in essence, To Do, not do nothing.

If we do follow the words of Jesus, if we let his positive law of love reign in our actions toward the poor, we will have life as today's psalmist said. Over the next week if you can, make a conscious effort to set aside some time in prayer to examine how we, ourselves can better answer Jesus' call recognise, respond to and to serve those in need. How can we do those little things that we can do? And can we start with ourselves?



### St. Feargal, Bishop and Missionary

Feast Day 27th November

Born in Ireland, Feargal of Virgil (Latin "Virgilius") is said to have been a descendant of Niall of the Nine Hostages. He become a



of Aghaboe (Annals of the Four Masters and the Annals of Ulster). In 743 he is said to have left Ireland to go to the Holy Land. He stopped first of all at the court of King Pepin the Short, father of Charlemagne. After spending two years at Cressy, near Compiègne, he went to Bavaria, at the invitation of Duke Odilo, where he founded the monastery of Chiemsee, and within a year or two was made Abbot of St. Peter's at Salzburg. Feargal is said to have built a cathedral at Salzburg. St Rupert had built one there before him and the present cathedral has both of them as patrons; it is the site of Mozart's baptism. Feargal baptized the Slavic dukes of Carinthia, and sent missionaries into Hungary. Returning from a preaching mission to a distant part of his diocese, he fell sick and died on 27th November 784. When the Salzburg cathedral was destroyed by a fire in 1181, the grave of Feargal was discovered and this led to his canonisation by Pope Gregory IX in 1233.

His feast is celebrated in Ireland and Austria.

### An Anniversary

Today, 22nd November, is the 57th anniversary of the assassination of President John Fitzgerald Kennedy in Dallas, Texas in 1963. I imagine that many of our readers who are of a certain vintage will remember where they were on that fateful evening when the news broke around the world. The President had visited Ireland in June of that year and huge crowds greeted him everywhere he went: from his visit to his ancestral home in Dunganstown, Co. Wexford, his address to the Houses of the Oireachtas, Arbour Hill where he placed a wreath on the graves of the leaders of the 1916 Rising and on to Limerick. 

Food and essential items list

All food is welcome, (baked beans, cereal, pasta, rice, tea etc.), and should be in date and in unbroken and undamaged packaging. Nothing should need refrigeration while unopened.

We try to avoid anything with peanuts.



#### The food items we especially welcome include:

- Coffee, (instant)
  Cooking sauces, e.g. for pasta, curry etc.
  Crackers
  Juice in 1 litre cartons or sets of individual cartons.
  Marmalade: for some reason we often have jam, but never marmalade!
  Meat: tins/jars of e.g. hot dogs, meatballs and pies.
  Tinned fruit
  Tinned vegetables: we often have peas and sometimes sweet corn, but other varieties are rare.
- Treats! The focus is on essential food but everyone deserves a treat, **e.g.** biscuits, chocolates, crisps, packets of concentrated jelly-cubes, ready-made custard etc.


