MARK'S PASSION NARRATIVE

The Passion Narrative in Mark's Gospel is the oldest account of Jesus' death as told by the early Christian community decades before it was written down by Mark. The main impression we get is not from the sufferings endured by Jesus but of the calm certainty with which he goes to his death. The story written by Mark is one of stark simplicity. When Pilate asks Jesus, "Are you the King of the Jews?" his simple



reply is "Yes" and when all manner of accusations are brought against him Jesus is silent. He offered no defence, no argument. His example gave strength and encouragement to the early Christian martyrs who were persecuted in Rome by Nero in 64 AD . These brave women and men handed on the story of the Passion and Death of Jesus by word of mouth before Mark wrote it down around 90 AD.

Mark's Passion Narrative begins with scenes of hostility and betrayal, love and service. The plot against Jesus comes as no surprise to the reader. As early as chapter3 his enemies were already discussing how to destroy him. His popularity with the crowd, especially during the festival, was their main reason for wanting to arrest him. They risked a riot if they arrested him in public. An inside collaborator was needed. Judas Iscariot fulfilled that role.

Before the betrayal, the noble action of an unnamed woman stands out as a gesture of love and discipleship. While he was at supper in the house of Simon, the leper, in Bethany, she comes in, breaks an alabaster jar of expensive ointment and pours it over the head of Jesus who points out to her critics that she was taking responsibility for his burial. Her faith and generosity stand in sharp contrast to the behaviour of Judas.

Jesus and his disciples move into the city of Jerusalem where preparations were made for the Passover meal. The "self-giving" of Jesus, represented in the giving of his body and blood juxtaposes with the "handing over" of Jesus by Judas in the Garden of Gethsemane. "The one

I kiss, he is the man. Take him away". As the arresting party laid hold of Jesus the disciples, leaving him, fled. Except for Peter, no more is heard of the disciples in the gospel of Mark, except the risen Jesus' message that they would see him in Galilee.

After recording Jesus' trial before the Sanhedrin, the false accusations, the denials of Peter, the handing over to Pilate, the choosing of Barabbas, the roar of the crowd to "Crucify him", the mocking by soldiers, the journey to Calvary, the nailing to the cross, Jesus' "loud cry" and last breath, the confession of the Roman centurion and the hasty burial, Mark concludes the Passion Narrative as he began with an act of loving service by women who returned to anoint his body on Easter morning.

As a vibrant and active worshipping community we have a great tradition of celebrating Holy Week, the Triduum and Easter Sunday. As we are following the guidelines during the pandemic we will have a redacted version of the ceremonies and ask you to engage, journey at home and share.

- On **Tuesday at 7:30pm** there will be a penance service.
- On the mornings of Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday at 10am we will pray the morning prayer of the Church as we have in previous years.
- On Holy Thursday at 3pm there will be a reflection for Children "Agape Do this in Memory of me" and The Mass of the Lord's Supper will be at 7.30pm.
- Good Friday 3pm Celebration of the Passion and Veneration of the Cross and Stations of the Cross at 7:30pm
- The Easter Vigil will be at 9pm on Holy Saturday.



Take a moment to think about

The parable of the penc

The Pencil Maker took the pencil aside - just before putting him into the box.

"There are 5 things you need to know," he told the pencil, "before I send you out into the world.

Always remember them and never forget - and you will become the best pencil you can be."

"One: You will be able to do many great things but only if you allow yourself to be held in someone's hand."

"Two: You will experience a painful sharpening from time to time - but you'll need it to become a better pencil."

"Three: You will be able to correct any mistakes you might make."

"Four: The most important part of you will always be what's inside."

"And Five: On every surface you are used on, you must leave

Create a Prayer Space for Holy Week

You could also make it the centerpiece of your table.



During a time when our Church buildings are closed, the Church as the people of God continues in our homes. With a few everyday items, you can create a special worship space in your home which can serve as a focus for your Holy Week Journey and remember this is a journey that you don't make alone, we all journey together

If you live on your own, remember that you are 'surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses' (Hebrews 12:1) as you pray, so you never worship alone! Also, in his letters, Paul frequently sends greeting to people and adds the phrase 'and to the church at your house' (see Romans 16:5, 1 Corinthians 16:19 and Colossians 4:15, for example), From the earliest time, worship happened in homes, not in special buildings. This could be an opportunity for us to walk in the shoes of those early followers of Christ.

This guide will help you set up a space to mark the events of Holy Week and Easter in your homes.

Scared Space

We invite you to create a simple sacred space in your home. This could be in the corner of your bedroom or sitting room. It should be somewhere that you can go for some guiet time each day. Use some symbols in your space - such as a cross, candles, a bible or some significant symbol for you. Try to add to this each day of Holy week that represents the day for you & your family significant prayers, events, people, symbols, pictures, etc. Be creative, yet keep it simple. Let it be your little oasis, sanctuary, it can also be the a gathering place for your family. It doesn't have to be a big space, but it should be somewhere that you see every day and can spend time - a family room or dining room is good.



Set the space apart by using a tablecloth or other piece of fabric – colours like purple, red and white are good. Use the visual symbol of a cross to show that the space is holy. It could be as simple as two sticks from your garden tied together with string. Add a candle to your space as a symbol of Christ's presence with you as you pray. Make sure that you never leave a candle burning unattended and that the candle is only lit for the duration of your prayer time.

If your house doesn't have much space, perhaps a special chair with a plant or a picture beside it will be enough to set apart that space as you Holy Week worship space. As Holy Week progresses, you can add different symbols to illustrate the story and help you enter into the journey.



Create sacred time, choose a time when you know you won't be distracted by other things. Turn off your computer or TV for a little while. If you are connecting to the Easter Liturgies through the TV, Social media or Parish webcam and disconnect from any social media. You may like to phone a friend and have your worship time together. Or just arrange with others in your parish to be praying at the same time.

Mark the beginning and end of the worship time with a sound - it could be a bell if you have one, a sentence of scripture, a piece of music, or something else you choose. Sit in such a way that you are able to focus on your prayer.

Sacred Conversations

Prayer time doesn't have to be just the liturgy or prayers. When you gather with the you family in your home, or when you phone a friend after your private prayer time, talk about the events of Holy Week and the bible stories which record them. Talk about your response to God's love which is


For children especially, these conversations don't have to be deep or complex. Starting a conversation with "I wonder..." is a great way to have a conversation about Easter. Even if you think you know 'the answer', there is much to be gained by wondering together.


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


