



"NO PEACE WITHOUT JUSTICE NO JUSTICE WITHOUT FORGIVENESS"

The three most deadly of the deadly sins are pride, anger and envy. They all arrive out of the deadliest of them all - pride and all three of them were on display with regard to the Pharisees. They were the ones most hostile to Jesus and caused endless difficulties. So how do we respond when we encounter difficult and hostile people in our day to day lives? We are called to love our neighbour to the point



of even loving enemies. But that doesn't mean we are doormats. Jesus was no wimp and he gave those who hate us the Sermon on the Mount. It was Mahatma Gandhi, the father of modern India, who took the principals of the Sermon on the Mount and used them in a very practical way to win political independence for India.

But perhaps we Irish had done that in our struggles. Here, we had Daniel O'Connell, the Liberator and C.S. Parnell the uncrowned King of Ireland, who used peaceful means to win us our personal, religious and national freedom.

Hatred, anger, envy and pride lead to a vicious circle of more of the same - there is another way centred on love, justice and forgiveness. St. Paul told the early Christians to fight evil by doing good and we have many examples from our own history of people doing that.

In more recent times, we had John Hume, the great Derry politician, whose watchword was that if we love our country, our culture and our society, let us first spill sweat instead of blood in our dealings with enemies who hate the things we love.

We conclude with a quote from Pope John Paul II, a man who was well used to standing up to Communist Pharisees, and he said "No Peace without Justice, no Justice without Forgiveness". We pray we will do likewise! Fr. Padraíg

ary. He was born about the year 1530. His father was employed by the Earl of Desmond and the family were relatively well off by the standard of the time. He was later ordained a priest for Limerick diocese. This was the era of Queen Elizabeth I and the penal laws against Catholics. O'Hurley and a companion came secretly to Ireland landing in Skerries. The companion, Fr Dillon, was recognised by a British agent Walter Baal. He was arrested and imprisoned for four months. O'Hurley was sheltered by the Baron of Slane. The Baron of Slane was in difficulty for harbouring him so the Archbishop decided to surrender himself to the authorities at Carrick on Suir. He was put in chains and brought to Kilkenny jail. He was brought to Dublin city dungeon on 7th Oct 1583. He was brought before the Lord Justices. O'Hurley was charged with being a party to an international conspiracy against Queen Elizabeth I. The Dublin Castle authorities had no evidence that would convict O'Hurley and so he was sentenced to death under the cover of martial law and without a trial. He was hanged the next day with a straw rope to add further ignominy to his torture. The place of execution was just outside the city of Dublin – what is now St

A letter from the Archbishop to all Parishioners ARCHBISHOP'S HOUSE

Dear Parishioner,

In the last fifteen months, we have been unable to do the things we normally do to express our faith and our solidarity with each other. This is not to say that the life of prayer and charity have ceased, but life's usual patterns have been disrupted, as have the deep practices that nourish our faith, empower our social solidarity, and animate the mission of the Church towards the poor and disadvantaged. Along with the countries of the developed world, our country has been fortunate that people have been supported during the significant economic upheaval and hardship of the pandemic. Even in our grief and loss, we have much to be thankful for.



Communities and parishes have shown resilience and imagination in their responses to the challenges of the pandemic. For many this has revealed new ways of collaboration and involvement. We also have to acknowledge that certain aspects of Church life have been severely impacted. One of these is parish finances, and while we eagerly long for a return to the life that we knew, we also have to act to ensure that our parishes have the financial minimum they need to survive. The necessary restriction of public worship has profoundly affected the two essential Sunday Mass collections on which parish funds depend. The first collection - as you know - supports clergy ministering throughout the diocese as well as sick and retired priests and priests working in other ministries throughout the diocese. The second collection - the 'Share' collection supports diocesan services to parishes especially disadvantaged parishes. In the last financial year, the clergy collection decreased by 54% and the 'Share' collection decreased by 65%. This year the situation is even more grave - with a decrease of 80% and 86% respectively for the first quarter (January to March 2021). That this would have happened, given the character of the necessary lockdowns, is not surprising. I am grateful to all who have continued to give so generously in the past 15 months.

This generosity cannot be expected to address the deeper financial challenges which the Archdiocese faces. I have therefore approved the proposal to hold a new Summer Dues collection to support priests of the diocese. This initiative will follow the pattern of the Christmas and Easter dues collections giving parishioners an opportunity to contribute to the income that supports priests.

The Summer Offering collection will be launched on the weekend of the 20th June. In making this appeal, I ask you to remember that the greatest resource of the Church is its people - both laity and clergy - working hand-in-hand. The age profile of the priest is rapidly increasing, and there are few vocations to priesthood and religious life. Yet the priests we have in the diocese continue to serve quietly week-in-week-out while more is being asked of fewer and fewer. The ministry and mission of our Church cannot continue without this humble, generous service.

I thank you for continuing to support our parishes and the clergy who work among you. Your generosity to this new initiative of Summer Dues will provide much needed practical and moral support for priests working quietly and effectively at the heart of every local community of faith.

While great strides have been made in getting the virus under control, there is still a way to go before our country and other nations are out of the woods. We are facing the summer with its the brighter mornings and long evenings. May the change of pace that summer brings provide a break from the darkness of the difficult winter we have endured. May the Holy Spirit lift our hearts, and renew our hope so that in 'our common home' we may share the life for which God created us (see Gen 1:3 1, 2:18, and John 10:10).


