

THE ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

The Assumption of Mary, celebrated on 15 August by the Catholic Church, Eastern Orthodox Churches, some Lutheran and Anglican Churches, honours the bodily taking up of Mary, the mother of Jesus, into heaven at the end of her earthly life. In the Eastern Churches the event is known as the "Falling asleep of the Mother of God"

The Assumption of the Virgin Mary does not appear anywhere in the Gospels but is found in Eastern writings from the 3rd and 4th centuries, and soon after was widely believed in the West,



In 1950 the Catholic Church, during the papacy of Pope Pius X11, defined as dogma that the Virgin Mary "having completed the course of her earthly life, was taken up body and soul into the glory of heaven". This dogma followed from the 1854 dogma of Mary's Immaculate Conception, both developing from her status as the Mother of God, meaning that she, like Jesus, was without sin, preserved from corruption, raised up and received into heaven.

The Gospel of the Mass for the Day puts before us an exchange of blessings and praise between Mary and her cousin Elizabeth. St. Luke's account of the Visitation is chosen because it highlights the special privileges bestowed by God on Mary and confirmed by Elizabeth when she gave a great cry and said, "Of all women you are



POPE PIUS X Feast Day 21st August

Born Giuseppe Sarto at Riese (Italy) in 1835; died in Rome on 20 August 1914. Noted for his love of poverty and for his promotion of liturgical participation, especially of frequent communion, to which he admitted young

children. A peasant by background, his motto as Pope was a pastoral one – *instaurare omnia in Christo* – "to restore all things in Christ". Giuseppe was elected Pope in 1903 and took the name Pius X, probably linking himself with Pope Pius IX as a conservative pope. In pursuit of his motto, "to renew all things in Christ", he initiated reforms of the liturgy and of canon law and took stern measures against "modernist" trends in theology. His efforts to avert world war were frustrated. Pius died with a reputation for sanctity during the early days of World War I on 20 August 1914. He wrote in his will: "I was born poor, I have lived poor and I wish to die poor." He was canonized by Pope Pius XII in 1954.

The tenth World Meeting of Families follows an unprecedented formula, being presented as a "multicentered and widespread" dimension. Rome will be the main venue, but on the days of the worldwide Church event, each diocese will be able to promote a local meeting for its own families and communities. Every family in the world can be a protagonist.

In his video message last July 2 on the occasion of the presentation of the extraordinary form of the Meeting, Pope Francis emphasized that "everyone will be able to participate, even those who cannot come to Rome."

The Holy Father urged diocesan communities, wherever possible, to plan initiatives based on the theme of the Meeting: "Family love: a vocation and a path to holiness."

"I ask you to be dynamic, active and creative in organising this with the families in harmony with what will be taking place in Rome," Pope Francis said. "This is a wonderful opportunity to devote ourselves with enthusiasm to family ministry with spouses, families and pastors together.


