Watch and Pray in November?

Bartimaeus is one of my favourite Gospel stories. I love the way Bartimaeus has the courage, the faith and trust to call for Jesus. Even so, Jesus' so called "friends" try to stop him but his desire to be healed by Jesus was so much bigger – nothing – no one could stop him. Being blind meant Bartimaeus was unable to participate in normal life. Probably abandoned by his family. Unable to work to provide for himself; depending on others.



His faith in Jesus encouraged him to speak up. His faith made him stand up for what he believed in. His faith in the Jesus healed him. He trusted in Jesus.

I believe nothing is impossible for God. With him on our side our eyes are being opened to life in a new way. Maybe look at our family and friends in new ways. Over the last few weeks I noticed the magnificent colours of nature. The leaves are changing colour, Autumn has truly arrived. However, many commented on the mild weather in recent days and there is no doubt it is linked to climate change. We are all aware that we have to "look" at the way we live in new ways.

Next month, a major Summit takes place and with that we are asked to pray for 24 hours for Climate Change. Climate change does affect all of us! Greta Thunberg, a young climate activist, made it very clear: "Act as if the house is on fire"

As people that believe in God the Creator of Heaven and Earth, we are invited to organize a watch party? "24 Hours for the Climate" is a global vigil for people of faith to pray and advocate for the success of COP26, the major United Nations Summit on climate change

from 31 October to 12 November. Our faith calls each of us to hold our nations' leaders accountable to the needs of God's creation, marginalized communities, and future generations. At COP26, we need negotiators to agree to stop all fossil fuel extraction by 2040, protect and restore ecosystems, and financially support developing countries as they adapt to climate change.

World Mission Sunday

World Mission Sunday is the Holy Father's annual appeal for spiritual and financial support so that the life-giving work of overseas mission and missionaries can continue. It always falls on the second last Sunday in October, meaning this year it will be celebrated on Sunday 24 October. This year's theme 'We Cannot Remain Silent – We cannot but speak about what we have seen and heard (Acts 4:20)' is twofold. It is a message of hope – Jesus Christ is risen and we cannot keep his love, compassion, and mercy to ourselves. It also challenges us to stand up and speak out on behalf of those who are weaker. All too often, the voices that need to be heard are not the loudest.

For them, we cannot remain silent.



St. Colman of Kilmacduagh - Feast Day 29th October

Colman hailed from Kilmacduagh, County Clare in the seventh century. After studying in Aran, where he founded two churches on Inis Mhor, he returned to become a hermit near Kinvarra. Induced later to undertake the monastic life he made a foundation at Kilmacduagh. He is said to have been its first abbot and bishop and had a reputation for being a vegetarian and having a great love of birds and animals. Today at



Kilmacduagh there are the remains of five churches, a leaning round tower 112 feet high that was restored in 1880, and the remains of an abbot's house. Saint Colman's abbatial crozier had been used through the centuries for the swearing of oaths. Although it was in the custodianship of the O'Heynes of Kiltartan (descendants of King Guaire) and their relatives, the O'Shaughnessys, it is now kept in the National Museum in Dublin.

The United Nations, as an organization, is well known to just about everyone around the world. They participate in activities ranging from assistance in times of disaster, both those coming from natural disasters and those caused by the wages of war. They offer medical assistance to those in need in these places, as well as providing clean water, food, and places to rest and recover. In 1945 the foundational treaty of the United Nations came into effect, the United Nations is an intergovernmental organization intent on create co-operation between all the governments of the world. It's original intent was to replace the League of Nations, and prevent another war like World War II from occurring. All the member states of the United Nations contribute finances to its operation to help further its goals. Aside from World Peace its role has grown to include protecting human rights, promoting social and economic development, and providing aid around the world in cases of famine, natural disaster, and armed conflict. The UN also represents a series of specialized agencies that enable it to do its job in each of the areas it focuses on, groups like the FAO (Food and Agricultural Organization), the IAEA (International Atomic Energy Agency), and more each handle their own individual aspect of its operation.
