**T**his weekend we begin a new liturgical year. First up is the season of Advent, a short few weeks with the focus on preparation for the great feast of Christmas when we celebrate the birth of Jesus our Saviour.

The few weeks leading up to Christmas are busy ones for many people. There is much to be done. There are Christmas cards to post, trees, decorations and lights to put up, presents to buy, food and drink to get in, homes to be cleaned and tidied in preparation for visitors. While there may be less by way of parties and social gatherings this year due to the prevalence of the Covid-19 virus, it can still be quite a hectic time.



Amid all the hustle and bustle it's important that we do not lose sight of the essential meaning of Christmas, which is the birth of Jesus. We rightly celebrate this wonderful self-revelation of God to us in the person of Jesus who ultimately brings about our redemption through his life, death and resurrection.

For Christians, Advent is a time of waiting. We look forward with an eager expectation to the birth of Christ at Christmas. Preparing for Christmas means preparing ourselves for the coming of the Lord. It's a time for taking stock, for reflecting, and for making adjustments to our way of living where necessary. We recognise that Christ has already come to us and we await his second coming again at the end of time. We aim to use the time of Advent to get ourselves properly prepared.

What can we do during Advent? We can make time for daily prayer, read some passages from the Bible and reflect on how we are answering the call of God who invites us daily to come and follow him. We can think of other people and maybe reach out in some helpful way to them. Perhaps we can visit an elderly relative or neighbour who may be living on their own and not as able to get out and about as before. We can tell family and friends that we love them and how much they mean to us. We can make a donation to a charity of our choice equivalent to what we might reasonably spend on a Christmas present. We can do a random act of kindness every day or week. We can go to Confession or attend a Service of Reconciliation in recognition of the fact that Jesus came to save us from our sins.

I wish you every blessing as we begin this new liturgical year. May your Advent season be a grace-filled time in which you experience God's great love for you. As we prepare for and await the Christmas festivities, we pray the great Advent prayer, ***Come, Lord Jesus.***

### St. Andrew (1st Century) Apostle Feast Day - 30th November

Andrew, a Galilean fisherman from Bethsaida, was the first disciple to be called by Jesus. He is said to have preached the gospel in Greece and to have been crucified at Patras. He is patron of Scotland, Russia and Greece. Andrew had been a disciple of John the Baptist. He was one of the two standing with John when Jesus passed and John stared hard at him and said, "Look, there is the lamb of God". The two disciples followed Jesus, who turned and asked them, "What do you want?" They answered, "Rabbi, Where do you live?" "Come and see." was Jesus's reply. They went and saw where he lived, and stayed with him the rest of the day. Early next morning, Andrew met his brother Simon and said to him, "We have found the Messiah," and he took Simon to Jesus. Jesus looked hard at Simon and said, "You are Simon, son of John, you are to be called Cephas", meaning Rock (Jn 1:35-42). Mark has a slightly different version: both fishermen brothers were casting their net in the lake, when Jesus said, "Follow me and I will make you into fishers of men. And at once they left their nets and followed him." (Mk 1:16-18). Peter subsequently takes the leadership role, but Andrew is always in the first four in the lists of the names of the twelve apostles. It is Andrew who points out there is a small boy there with five barley loaves and two fish from which the crowd were miraculously fed (Jn 6:1-9). It is Andrew who helps Philip to bring the Greeks along who want to see Jesus (Jn 12:20-22). Andrew is said to have evangelised in Asia Minor and Greece. It was also said that he was martyred by crucifixion at the city of Patras (Patræ) in Achaëa. Early texts, such as the Acts of Andrew known to Gregory of Tours, describe Andrew as bound, not nailed, to a Latin cross of the kind on which Jesus is said to have been crucified; yet a tradition developed that Andrew had been crucified on a cross of the form called Crux decussata (X-shaped cross, or "saltire"), now commonly known as a "Saint Andrew's Cross" — supposedly at his own request, as he deemed himself unworthy to be crucified on the same type of cross as Jesus

## INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR THE ABOLITION OF SLAVERY - 2nd December

According to the International Labour Organisation (ILO) more than 40 million people worldwide are victims of modern slavery. Although modern slavery is not defined in law, it is used as an umbrella term covering practices such as forced labour, debt bondage, forced marriage, and human trafficking. Essentially, it refers to situations of exploitation that a person cannot refuse or leave because of threats, violence, coercion, deception, and/or abuse of power. In addition, more than 150 million children are subject to child labour, accounting for almost one in ten children around the world. The ILO has adopted a legally binding Protocol designed to strengthen global efforts to eliminate forced labour, which entered into force in November 2016.

Slavery has evolved and manifested itself in different ways throughout history. Today some traditional forms of slavery still persist in their earlier forms, while others have been transformed into new ones. The UN human rights bodies have documented the persistence of old forms of slavery that are embedded in traditional beliefs and customs. These forms of slavery are the result of long-standing discrimination against the most vulnerable groups in societies, such as those regarded as being of low caste, tribal minorities and indigenous peoples.

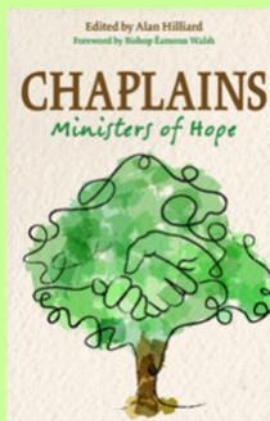

As we begin the season of Advent, you might find these resources helpful for reflection during the first week.



### Week 1 - Hope

*Listen in the silence. Listen in the noise. Listen for the sound of the Spirit's voice.*

**Before we begin:** This is the first week of Advent and there are four candles. We are focusing on the work of quieting and listening in order to listen for God's voice. We begin with all the lights lit, the four candles of the Advent wreath, the four candles in our illustration, then each week quiet another candle to our goal of focusing and listening only for God-with-us. Emmanuel. Listen to the God who brings HOPE!

**Invocation**  
God of hope, we are going to listen for you as we start this new church year. Help us to quiet all the other sounds and commotion around us and listen only for you as we wait in hope for the day when we will celebrate your incarnation.

**Confession**  
God, it seems like it started even earlier this year. All the ads and the decorations, the special songs and the movies on tv. The sound of the season is deafening. This year we want to quiet the input a little more each week until we can hear your Word speaking to us. Please be patient with us as we try to listen for your Spirit's voice.


**Psalms 90:1-19**  
Give ear, O Shepherd of Israel, you who lead Joseph like a flock!  
Restore us, O Lord God of hosts; let your face shine, that we might be saved.

**1 Corinthians 13:3-9**  
Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind - just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you - so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ. God is faithful; by him you were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

**Prayer**  
Creator God, restore our hope even when we can't quite hear you. Sometimes it seems like you are far away. Give us hope that you are present in every bit of your creation, every flower, animal, every single person. Help us to listen in the silence.

Christ, restore our hope even when there is so much chatter that we struggle to hear which voice is yours. Give us hope that we can help one another. Give us hope that we will find ways to feed and care for all people and, above all, treat everyone with respect. Help us to listen in the noise.

Holy Spirit, restore our hope that you are with us and will help us. Give us the ears to hear those who are speaking out in love. Give us wisdom to know your voice when we hear it. Help us to listen for the sound of your voice. Amen



**A time to be still**  
You are invited into a time of silence. Take a deep breath and exhale slowly. Where do you see the God of HOPE?


*Poetry is the practice of silencing the extra words so that feelings can show. This year we are exploring poetry as a spiritual practice. By slowing down, pondering, and picking words, we can better hear what God is saying to us.*

Here is an easy way to start a 8-line poem:  
When you are calm and ready, use the space below to write one word in a noun that stands out for you from the Bible verses. Beneath that word (Line 2) write 2 words that describe the title. For Line 3 think of 3 action words that end in "ing". Line 4 is a 4-word phrase or sentence that tells more about the title word. For the last line, Line 5, think of a single word that refers back to Line 1 - a word that gives meaning for you. For example:

*Ear  
Alert Eager  
Listening, Yearning, Anticipating  
Waiting for God's voice  
Hope*

Remember that this is not a contest. There is no grade. It is just a time to hang out with God and write down what comes to mind.

Read over your poem and then sit quietly with it, or colour the illustration.
