

Parish Newsletter



This Sunday's Gospel, the parable of the Prodigal Son, is probably one of the best known of all the parables preached by Jesus. It tells a simple straight-forward story that people can easily understand and relate to. It is rich in meaning and provides plenty for us to think about as we move into the second half of our Lenten season this year.

The parable is set in the context of complaints made by the Pharisees about the ongoing association of Jesus with sinners and the welcome that he had for them. Jesus consistently preaches about the unbounded love of God for everyone. This rankles with the Pharisees who preached a love of God conditional on a person being of good behaviour and right living.

While the parable is usually referred to as that of the Prodigal Son, it is the father who is the key figure in this parable. Even from the very beginning of the parable the father is portrayed as an amazingly generous person. When requested by his younger son, the father gives his son, upfront and without any question, half of the inheritance that would only be his right to claim after the father's death. The father places no restrictions on his younger son and allows him to live as he chooses. The father never loses his love and concern for his younger son regardless of how the young man was squandering his life and resources.

It is the reaction of the father when the errant younger son returns home that captures the attention in this parable. It is so unexpected. The father actually runs to meet his son and welcomes him home with great joy. The father is not interested in hearing excuses or explanations, but sets about immediately restoring his younger son to his place in the home.

He celebrates this homecoming in a sumptuous way.

When we began the Lenten journey earlier this month, we promised to repent and be faithful to the Gospel. Regardless of what has happened in our lives, whether our sins and failings have been big or small, God our Father is waiting to welcome us home. Let us not spurn the wonderful opportunity

It takes courage to be honest with ourselves and acknowledge our weaknesses and failings. When we do, and when like the younger son in the parable we make that decision to start out on the road home, we can be confident of God's welcome for

that Lent offers of being reconciled with God.

us. God delights in showing mercy and extending forgiveness to those who come to him with contrite hearts. Our God is a God of love and compassion. He watches and waits for us to come home to him this Lent.

A Brief History of Mother's Day

Celebrations of mothers and motherhood can be traced back to the ancient Greeks and Romans, who held festivals in honor of the mother goddesses Rhea and Cybele, but the clearest modern precedent for Mother's Day is the early Christian festival known as "Mothering Sunday." Once a major tradition in the United Kingdom and parts of Europe, this celebration fell on the fourth Sunday in Lent and was originally seen as a time when the faithful would return to their "mother church"—the main church in the vicinity of their home—for a special service. The

origins of Mother's Day as celebrated in the United States date back to the 19th century. In the years before the Civil War, Ann Reeves Jarvis of West Virginia helped start "Mothers' Day Work Clubs" to teach local women how to properly care for their children. These clubs later became a unifying force in a region of the country still divided over the Civil War. In 1868 Jarvis organized "Mothers' Friendship Day," at which mothers gathered with former Union and Confederate soldiers to promote reconciliation. Another precursor to Mother's Day came from the abolitionist and suffragette Julia Ward Howe. In 1870 Howe wrote the "Mother's Day Proclamation," a call to action that asked mothers to unite in promoting world peace. In 1873 Howe campaigned for a "Mother's Peace Day" to be celebrated every June 2.

POPE AT AUDIENCE: ELDERLY ARE IRREPLACEABLE AT PASSING ON THE FAITH



Continuing his catechesis at the Wednesday General Audience on the meaning and value of old age, Pope Francis turns his attention to the special vocation of the elderly to hand on to new generations their personal experience of the Church's faith.

During the General Audience on Wednesday from the Paul VI Hall, the Pope told those present that, at the end of the exodus, the aged Moses hands down in a magnificent song his own long experience of faith in the Lord who remains ever faithful to his promises.

He explained that the "Song of Moses" is also "the memory of the history lived with God, of the adventures of the people formed from faith in the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob." "Moses also remembers the bitterness and disappointments of God Himself: His faithfulness continually put to the test by the infidelities of His people," said the Pope. Nowadays, commented Pope Francis, the Church's efforts to evangelize, and transmit the faith takes place with the aid of books, films and other resources. Yet, he added, nothing can replace the direct person-to-person storytelling of a life-long experience of closeness to God in faith. "In our culture, which is so 'politically correct,' he noted, "this path seems to be hindered in many ways."

Therefore, the Pope added, we greatly need the wisdom and experience of the elderly to help new generations know the Church from the inside, to live lives of fidelity to God's word, to persevere in hope amid trials, and to show compassionate love for all our brothers and sisters. In conclusion, the Pope said, "the narration of the history of faith should be like the Canticle of Moses, like the testimony of the Gospels and the Acts of the Apostles."

In other words, he continued, "a story capable of recalling God's blessings with emotion and our failings with sincerity.

Finally, Pope Francis encouraged the faithful to value the precious vocation that is the elderly as we cherish the gifts of the past and look forward to the fulfilment of God's promises in the coming of his Kingdom.
