Differences of opinion, conflict and controversy have been part and parcel of the life of the Church from the earliest Christian times. The world is ever-changing and new issues and problems are constantly arising that need to be addressed in the light of the Gospel as Christian people and communities seek to live authentically as disciples of Jesus in the world. In today's first reading at Mass, we read about a controversy within the Christian community at Antioch.

A debate arose as to what extent new converts to Christianity should observe the tradition of Moses. Many Jews who became Christian carried over the practices that had been part of their Jewish lives and continued to observe them. In contrast, those who came to the Christian faith from a gentile background had no such religious practices to bring with them. Paul and Barnabas attempted to mediate and resolve the difference of opinion locally, but without success. The matter is referred to the apostles and elders in Jerusalem who meet to adjudicate on it. In the Council of Jerusalem, the first officially recognised council of the Church, the discussion is led by Peter and eventually they all agree on a compromise position proposed by James. The apostles and elders then set out their position in an apostolic letter to the Church in Antioch which Paul and Barnabas and two other delegates took back with them. When they arrived in Antioch, the whole community gathered together and Paul and Barnabas read the letter to them.

As we embark on the synodal process initiated by Pope Francis, we see many Christian communities in similar situations coping with controversy today. There are serious differences of opinion as to what the important issues are and how to resolve them. We see a very hierarchical clerical structure in our Church under pressure as lay men and women rightly seek to have their voices heard and their views taken seriously. The Catholic Church in Germany, for example, in which a synodal process is already well under way, is very

divided and polarised on many issues. The Catholic Church in the United States is similarly affected.

In this Sunday's Gospel reading we hear of the Holy Spirit which is given as a gift to the Church to enable it to be faithful to the teaching of Jesus. We pray that the Holy Spirit will inform our deliberations and discussions in these times as we engage in the world-wide synodal process that Pope Francis has set in train. In particular, we pray that the Holy Spirit will help us in Dublin to discern a new way forward with the Building Hope initiative recently launched by our Archbishop, Dermot Farrell, to develop a pastoral strategy for the Diocese of Dublin over the coming years.

in humble and loving service.





May 26 - St Philip Neri (1515-95)

Born in Florence (Italy) in 1515; died at Rome on 26th May in 1595. An outstanding proponent of Church reform after the Council of Trent. Worked among the young and the poor in Rome and founded the Congregation of the Oratory. Honoured as a spiritual director, for his pastoral initiatives, and for his humour, simplicity, and charity. Called Pippo Buono or "good little Phil" from boyhood, Philip had a very sociable disposition and he used this to lead people to God. He was the founder of a congregation called the Oratorians, which Cardinal Newman joined. The Roman people loved and venerated Philip, and visitors even came from other countries to speak with him. In the words of one of his biographers, 'He was all things to all men.... when he was called upon to be merry, he was so; if there was a demand upon his sympathy, he was equally ready'. Two years before his death Philip retired from his office as superior in favour of his disciple, Caesar Baronius, later to be made Cardinal. He obtained permission from the Pope to celebrate Mass daily in a little Oratory adjoining his room. On the Feast of Corpus Christi, 25 May 1595, Philip was in a radiantly happy mood, and his physician told him that he had not looked so well for ten years. He alone realized that his hour had come. All day he heard confessions and saw visitors as usual. About midnight, he had a severe haemorrhage and the fathers in the house were called to his bedside. Unable to speak, Philip raised his hand, and in the act of benediction passed to his reward. He had reached the age of eighty and his work was done. Six years later he was beatified; Pope Gregory XV canonized him in 1622.


PRAYER FOR PEACE IN UKRAINE





WYD Lisbon 2023 announces 13 patron saints for young pilgrims

The press office of World Youth Day announces the 13 patron saints of WYD Lisbon to act as models for the young people who will gather in the capital of Portugal on 1-6 August 2023. Cardinal Manuel Clemente, the Patriarch of Lisbon, says these patrons "have shown that life in Christ fills and saves the youth of all times." In a press statement released on Tuesday, the Cardinal explores the contribution each holy person can make in the lives of young people.

"The patroness par excellence of the next World Youth Day is the Virgin Mary, the young woman who accepted to be the mother of the incarnate Son of God"

He added that all 13 men and women "dedicated themselves to the service of youth", especially St. John Bosco and St. Vincent. Cardinal Clemente tied in four young Blesseds who died at a young age in the past century: Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati, an Italian man who encouraged others with "his dynamism, joy, and charity Blessed Marcel Callo, a French young man who died in a forced labor camp in Germany; Blessed Chiara Badano, an Italian teenager who died from a painful bone cancer; and, Blessed Carlo Acutis, an Italian teenager who spread the word of God through the nascent internet and later died from leukemia.
