### ST BARNABAS - SETTLING DISPUTES

St. Barnabas was one of the important figures in the early church as he was a close collaborator of St. Paul. He was probably in Jerusalem in the immediate aftermath of Pentecost and was one of the first converts to Christianity as Peter and the apostles began their missionary activity. Barnabas was instrumental in founding a thriving church in Antioch and it was here that the new members of Christ's church were first referred to as Christians, He met St. Paul after his conversion and it was Barnabas who introduced him to the apostles in Jerusalem. Because of Paul's history of being a persecutor of Christians he had difficulty in being accepted by some members of the church. It was Barnabas who reassured those who were skeptical of Paul's motives and ultimately he was accepted as a key member of the new church.

As Paul began his great mission to the Gentiles it was Barnabas who was his closest collaborator. Both were similar in personality – energetic and strong willed. But these characteristics were to be a cause of disagreement between them while in Cyprus. Eventually there was reconciliation but the details of how this happened were never recorded. This illustrates that even among Christians who are dedicated to bringing the good news of the Gospel to others, disputes can arise as to how best to do it. Disputes, conflicts and disagreements are part of the human condition and it is inevitable that we will be involved in at least one in our lifetime. It may be at parish, at diocesan or even at the level of the Vatican. This is not always a bad thing – indeed those who are experts in management techniques would say a certain level of conflict is a healthy sign of a thriving organisation. It forms the basis for a lot of creativity and energises the people working there. Of course when it's allowed to get out of control and certain individuals go to extremes, it can be very destructive. In managing conflict those who are experts recommend it is essential that some mechanism of settling disputes be put in place with a senior person having the final say. Disputes are unlikely to get out of hand when those in

positions of leadership encourage an atmosphere of give and take, of a willingness to see other people's point of view and a willingness to accept constructive criticism. It was how disputes were settled in the early church and as long as the conflicting parties showed a measure of goodwill, the outcome was usually favourable.

This showing of goodwill towards people we are in dispute with is part and parcel of Jesus' commandment to love our neighbour as ourselves. Sometimes, as in the case of Paul and Barnabas, it can be difficult to do this. But if we pray and avail of the sacraments and humbly acknowledge that ultimately God is in charge then good will come out of it. We pray that St. Barnabas will inspire us to be instruments of Christ's peace and bring reconciliation to those who are experiencing a painful conflict.



WORLD COMMUNICATIONS DAY Sunday 29th May 2022

"Listening with the ear of the heart"

World Communications Day will be celebrated on Sunday 29 May – the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord. Pope Francis has chosen to reflect on the theme of 'Listening with the ear of the heart'. This year's message is an invitation to reflect on how listening involves more than simply the sense of hearing. True listening is a foundation of genuine relationships, and is foundational to the relationship between God and humanity. In his message Pope Francis notes that many people 'are quickly losing the ability to listen to one another, while at the same time listening is undergoing new developments, especially due to new forms of communicating.' The Holy Father highlights the importance of listening in the context of the Synodal Process, which the Church is currently engaged in at a local and universal level. In his message Pope Francis says,

`The most important task in pastoral activity is the 'apostolate of the ear' – to listen before speaking, as the Apostle James exhorts, 'Let every man be quick to hear, slow to speak' (1:19). Freely giving some of our own time to listen to people is the first act of charity.

'A synodal process has just been launched. Let us pray that it will be a great opportunity to listen to one another. Communion, in fact, is not the result of strategies and programmes, but is built in mutual listening between brothers and sisters.

'With the awareness that we participate in a communion that precedes and includes us, we can rediscover a symphonic Church, in which each person is able to sing with his or her own voice, welcoming the voices of others as a gift to manifest the harmony of the whole that the Holy Spirit composes.'










# A thought for this Sunday for our Polish Parishioners

# St Kevin of Glendalough – Feast Day 3<sup>rd</sup> June

His father was named Caomhlugh and his mother

Caoimheall or Coemella. According to legend, when the boy was being brought to the priest Cronan for baptism, a person appeared and breathed on the child, blessing him and calling him Coemgen. Cronan believed this was an angel and said, "So shall he always be called Coemgenus ('beautiful born') for he will be most beautiful". His parents brought him to the monastery of Kilnamanagh in Tallaght near Dublin and here he underwent instruction and spiritual formation by three holy men, Eoghan, perhaps of Ardstraw, Lóchán and Éanna of Kilnamanagh. But at an early age he wandered off into the Wicklow Mountains and spent time in solitude at first at Hollywood near Blessington and finally in Glendalough. His three teachers came and took him back to the monastery where he continued his studies. Kevin was ordained priest by Bishop Lugidius and founded a monastery at Cluainduaich, though the location of this is unknown. He soon was back again at Glendalough in search of solitude and the ascetical life. He first settled near the upper lake, and lived in a narrow cave in a rock above the lake still to be seen today and called 'St Kevin's Bed'. A community of monks gathered round him, so he set up and ran a monastic settlement in the lower valley. After his death this became a monastic city. As an abbot who founded a monastic city, Kevin chose to remain as a priest rather than become a bishop. He spent most of his life at Glendalough. Before his death Kevin decided to remain permanently at his hermitage, asking his monks not to visit, bring food or disturb him in any way. The wild

animals kept him company.
