MIRRORING THE GOOD SHEPHERD

On the Fourth Sunday of Easter each year the Gospel reading is taken from chapter 10 of St John's Gospel which develops the theme of the Good Shepherd. Shepherds were part of daily life in Jesus' time. A good shepherd knew his sheep by name, cared for and protected them. They recognised his voice and followed him wherever he led them. Jesus used the image of the shepherd to describe himself and his relationship with

us. The church is the sheepfold. We are his people, the sheep of his flock. Following him and listening to his voice is our calling.

We all have a calling, an occupation to which we are especially drawn. We refer to this as our vocation in life. By living out our baptismal call to follow and imitate Jesus we discover what our specific call is. We can do this as a single or married person, an ordained priest or a vowed religious. Regardless of whatever path we choose, we are all called to a personal relationship with God, to love and care for others and the environment and to live our lives according to the Gospel.

Before being called to SOMETHING we are called to SOMEONE. Before being called to DO we are called to BE.

It is fitting that Good Shepherd Sunday is a day of special prayer for vocations to the work of service in the church. While praying for vocations to the priesthood and religious life let us not forget the good people who volunteer as members of parish councils, readers, ministers of the Eucharist, choir leaders, members of various groups, parish workers, finance committees, St Vincent de Paul, prayer groups, all who have heard the call of the Good Shepherd and follow him in service.

Jesus said, "The sheep that belong to me listen to my voice; I know them and

they follow me. I give them eternal life; they will never be lost and no one will steal them from me." Shepherd is one of the biblical titles for a leader. Parents, teachers, ministers of Church and State are called to exercise the gift of leadership. They are entrusted with authority and the care of others. They are the shepherds of today. Their model is Jesus, the Good Shepherd.

On this Good Shepherd Sunday let us remember and celebrate with gratitude, all who are shepherding us by touching our lives, mirroring the Good Shepherd for us and leading by example.

Feast of Our Lady of Fatima - 13th May

Lúcia Santos and her two cousins, Jacinta and Francisco Marto were three shepherd children to whom Our Lady appeared at Fatima in Portugal on the 13th day of six consecutive months starting on 13th May 1917.



Lúcia described the vision as "brighter than the sun" and said the lady told them three secrets, asked them to do penance and make sacrifices to save sinners. The children then began to wear tight cords around their waists, abstained from drinking water on hot days and did other works of penance. The lady told them to say the Rosary every day, and that saying the Rosary was the way to 'personal peace and world peace.' On 13th October, with a crowd of 70,000 people gathered, there appeared to be a fast and whirling movement of the sun that bystanders called "dancing" and these phenomena were visible for up to forty kilometres away.

Less than two years later, in 1919, Francisco died of influenza in his family home. He was 11. Jacinta died the next year of influenza in Lisbon. She was just 10. During her illness she offered her suffering for the conversion of sinners, peace in the world and the Holy Father. She was re-buried in the Fatima basilica in 1951. In a public ceremony at Fatima on 13th May 1989 Pope John Paul II declared both Francisco and Jacinta venerable and returned there to beatify them on 13th May 2000. Jacinta is the youngest non-martyred child ever to be beatified. Lúcia moved to Oporto in 1921 and at 14 was admitted as a boarder in the School of the Sisters of St. Dorothy in Vilar. In October 1925, she became a postulant in the Dorothean convent in Tuy, Spain, made her first vows there on 3rd October

She had been blind and deaf for some years prior to her death of cardiorespiratory failure, due to her advanced age. This came on 13th February 2005. The 13th day of the month had been the date of the apparitions. The day of her funeral, February 15, 2005, was declared a day of national mourning in Portugal. On the third anniversary of her death, 13th February 2008, Pope Benedict XVI announced that in Lúcia's case he was waiving the five year waiting period prescribed by ecclesiastical law before opening a cause for beatification, thus putting her on a fast track for canonisation, as was done for Mother Teresa and Pope John Paul II. This moment is all you have. The past is already lost, the future may be promising but it is still a fairy tale. Only the present is, and it always is. There is no moment in which you are not in the present. You are eternally immersed in it.

When someone is bereaved, the only thing you can do is be there to listen when they need to talk, and be silent when silence is best. Recognise that the bereavement is theirs, not yours, and do not try to stop the pain or rush them through their grieving. They need love and patience. And they need time.

When you really live in hope, you do not deny darkness or negativity or pain, but neither do you give in or resign yourself to it. In hope you hold all the abuse and conflicts all around you, the wars, the misuse of power, the abuse and neglect of people, believing that the Divine power is greater than the tragedy you see around you.

POPE'S MAY PRAYER INTENTION : "For Faith-Filled Young People"



As the Church marks the Marian month of May and prepares for the upcoming World Meeting of Families in late June, Pope Francis is urging Catholics to pray for young people and their response to God's call to holiness. He held up the example of the Blessed Virgin Mary as a model for Christian family life. "When I think of a model with whom young people can identify, our Mother, Mary, always comes to mind: her courage, the way she knew how to listen, and her dedication to service." Pope Francis lauded Mary's courageous and determined "yes" to the Lord, and called on young Catholics to imitate her readiness to

improve the world. He said young people must learn to take risks, in order to "build something new, a better world."

"Don't forget that in order to follow Mary you need to discern and discover what Jesus wants from you, not what you might think you can do," said the Pope.

Pope Francis wrapped up his video message by inviting everyone to pray for young people as they make their way through life.

"Let us pray, brothers and sisters, that all young people, called to live life to the fullest, may discover in Mary's life the way to listen, the depth of discernment, the courage of faith, and dedication to service."
