DO YOU REMEMBER SUMMER 2015?

The celebration of Reek Sunday was cancelled because of dangerous weather. Tragedy hit in June 2015 when six young students died after a balcony on which they were standing collapsed (known as the Berkeley balcony collapse). Later in the year ten people lost their lives in a fire in Carrickmines.

On a happier note: Kilkenny was crowned the All-Ireland Senior Hurling Championship and Dublin won the All-Ireland Senior Football Championship.

And in the midst of it all – I was commissioned to start my ministry in the CCPC (Clondalkin/ Bawnogue/ Rowlagh Neilstown parish of the Travelling People/ Deansrath/Sruleen).

Over the past seven years together we created our own memories and made history but it all started in the summer 2015. Sat 6.30pm

Remember the First Welcoming Ceremony for those families who wish to baptise their child in the parish? Or the Sunday in May when we had families for the Welcoming Ceremonies as well as about seven children making their first Holy Communion.

What a wonderful day for the parish.

I remember the first ever joint Catholic School week's celebration with TY's from Coláiste Bríde and Moyle Park in the Village Church. In 2018 Ireland welcomed Pope Francis to celebrate the World Meeting of Families and with that the parish of Clondalkin took on the challenge to host the KISI (Gods singing kids) from Austria. 120 people aged between a few months and in their sixties. You made it happen by donating sleeping bags and helped

creating a sleeping area in Scoil Mhuire (as well as a canteen). Their yellow / orange gowns will always stay with me.

At the same time the Altar Servers (finally) got recognized and were given the opportunity to celebrate the Eucharist with many Bishops and Cardinals from all over the world and by the end some got to shake hands with Pope Francis.

During the pandemic we had to get creative on how to connect with each other. Like many others we moved online and you got a glimpse of my kitchen table and the wisdom of my wonderful children Grace, Lily and Fionn.

Over the past few years we went of pilgrimages together as pilgrims from the Clon-mino to Knock, from Glendalough to Krakow, from Rome to Panama.

There are many other smaller and bigger occasions that we got to celebrate, share and experience together. I will cherish those memories forever.

Now that my boxes are packed and I am preparing to move to my new ministry to the grouping Springfield / Brookfield / Jobstown, I wanted to say THANK YOU to each and every one of you. Without you, your openness, your support, your prayers, your time and your energy, nothing (of the above) would have happened. Thank you!

OUR LADY OF MOUNT CARMEL Feast Day 16th July



The Story of Our Lady of Mount Carmel

Hermits lived on Mount Carmel near the Fountain of Elijah in northern Israel in the 12th century. They had a chapel dedicated to Our Lady. By the 13th century they became known as "Brothers of Our Lady of Mount Carmel." They soon celebrated a special Mass and Office in honor of Mary. In 1726, it became a celebration of the universal Church under the title of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. For centuries the Carmelites have seen themselves as specially related to Mary. Their great saints and theologians have promoted devotion to her and often championed the mystery of her Immaculate Conception. Saint Teresa of Avila called Carmel "the Order of the Virgin." Saint John of the Cross credited Mary with saving him from drowning as a child, leading him to Carmel, and helping him escape from prison. Saint Thérèse of the Child Jesus believed that Mary cured her from illness. On her First Communion day, Thérèse dedicated her life to Mary. During the last days of her life she frequently spoke of Mary. There is a tradition - which may not be historical that Mary appeared to Saint Simon Stock, a leader of the Carmelites, and gave him a scapular, telling him to promote devotion to it. The scapular is a modified version of Mary's own garment. It symbolizes her special protection and calls the wearers to consecrate themselves to her in a special way. The scapular reminds us of the gospel call to prayer and penance - a call that Mary models in a splendid way.

Reflecting on the Gospel during the week I kept thinking about to the Priest and the Levite. I kept wondering why did they not stop? Were they too busy? Didn't care? Because he was not "their" brother? What was their excuse not to do the obvious? Jesus makes it really clear there are no excuses to be kind, helping, caring and loving. But aren't we all sometimes the Priest or the Levite? I am under no illusion that sometimes I might be the Priest or the Levite in today's Gospel – I did not stop, looked the other way or just went out of my way not to see what needed to be done or what would have been the right thing to do. I am not short of excuses for why... but it does not take away from the importance of Jesus' message:

You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbour as yourself. The beauty of our Faith is that we are given the chance to start again. I might have been the Priest/Levite yesterday but I pray that with God's help I will become more and more like the Samaritan each day moving forward. After all, Jesus' message is not just for the one moment in time, it is for life.

National Grandparents Pilgrimage: A Celebration of World Day For Grandparents & The Elderly - 24th July 2022

We are delighted to celebrate this special day in person at Knock Basilica on Sunday, July 24th 2022 for the first time since 2019. The Chief celebrant on the day will be Archbishop Francis Duffy, Archbishop of Tuam and Patron of The Catholic Grandparents Association. Ceremonies will commence with Anointing of the Sick at 2.30pm, with Mass at 3pm and concluding with a special reflection by Catherine Wiley, Founder of the Catholic Grandparents Association. Pope Francis established a World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly which took place for the first time in 2021. In 2022, the celebration will fall on Sunday 24 July, the Sunday closest to the Feast of Saints Joachim and Anne, Grandparents of Jesus. The theme chosen by Pope Francis for this year's celebration is: "In old age they will still bear fruit" (Psalm 92:15). The announcement of a new Church-wide celebration for Grandparents and the Elderly came in answer to our prayerful request to the Holy Father Pope Francis. This new worldwide celebration in the Universal Church calendar is a momentous achievement for Grandparents and the Elderly and will hopefully reassure them that they are loved and that they are needed.

For those who are unable to join the pilgrimage in person, the ceremonies will be streamed live on the Knock Shrine <u>website.</u>
