GREED OR GOD?

A quarrel over an inheritance can occur even in the most united of families. Greed for money or material possessions then begins to show itself. In today's Gospel a man asks Jesus to pass a favourable judgement in a dispute with his brother over a family inheritance. Jesus, refusing to be entangled in a dispute over who is to possess what, invites him and others around him to look at the root of the problem which is " greed", because a person's life is not made secure by what they own, even when they have more than they need.

Jesus then tells the story of the rich man who has such an abundance of crops that he has run out of storage space. The question of sharing his abundance with others less well off does not arise. Instead, the rich man decides to pull down his existing barns and build larger ones to store his grain. He then has a conversation with himself and assures himself that he has plenty of goods for the future so he can now relax and enjoy himself: "My soul you have plenty of good things laid by for many years to come; take things easy, eat, drink and have a good time."

But God had a different plan for him. In this, the only parable in Luke's Gospel where God directly addresses a character, says to the rich man: "You fool, this very night demand will be made of your soul and this hoard of yours, whose will it be then?".

The rich fool in the parable discovered too late that material wealth is not a permanent possession. Because he had devoted all his energy to amassing property, he had nobody he could call his own. No one else appears in the story. He appears to be on his own. He speaks only to himself and only about his possessions. With him it is all "Me, Myself and I".

" I will pull down my barns...I will build bigger ones... I will store my grain and my goods...I will eat and drink and have a good time..."

This is what happens when greed takes over. Greed makes us hoarders instead of carers. The alternative is to make ourselves "rich in the sight of God" by sharing and caring for others, especially those in need and caring also for our common home, the earth.

Our lives and possessions are not our own but gifts given to us to be shared. By sharing and caring we "store up treasure for ourselves in Heaven and become rich in the sight of God".

St Colman of Cloyne (530-606)

St Colman, Bishop Colman Mac Lenine, was born around 530, probably in West Cork. A bard by profession, he is reputed to have been influenced by St Brendan to become a priest. Colman's principal



foundation (560) was at Cloyne, *Cluain Uamha*, "Meadow of the Caves", in east Cork, which Cairpre Crom, king of Munster, gave him as a site for a monastery and monastic school. A round tower and pre-reformation cathedral (now Church of Ireland) still stand at the site. The Danes plundered Cloyne in 822, 824 and 885. The Diocese of Cloyne was named at the Synod of Kells in 1152. A Catholic cathedral of St Colman was built at Cobh, beginning in 1868 and completed in the early years of the 20th century. Another foundation associated with Colman was at Kilmaclenine, near Buttevant, in north Cork, which is said to have been his birth-place. He died in 606. His feast is observed on 24th November.

THE SOLEMNITY OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST, KING OF THE UNIVERSE

Pope Pius XI created this feast in 1925. The Blackshirts under Mussolini were already in power in Italy. A comical-looking rabble-rouser called Adolf Hitler had just become leader of

the Nazi party in Germany. The world lay in the Great Depression and atheism was on the increase. What Pius XI was doing in creating this feast was to say to the world that despite dictatorships and economic collapse and false values,

Jesus Christ was still King of the Universe. In 1969 Pope Paul VI gave the feast its current date on the last Sunday in the liturgical year.

He also established it as a solemnity (which is of highest liturgical rank) and gave it a new title – The Solemnity of Our

Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. This is a tremendous feast with which to end the liturgical year because it turns upside down all the pre-conceived ideas we have about hierarchy, kingship and what it means to be in authority.

As we hear in today's Gospel (Luke 23:35-43), Jesus' accusers fail to understand:

... As for the leaders, they jeered and mocked him. "He saved others," they said "let him save himself if he is the Christ of God, the Chosen One." The soldiers mocked him too, and when they approached to offer him vinegar they said, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself."

Their idea of kingship is of an all-powerful ruler, controller and dictator. Jesus' actions have made it clear that he is not that kind of king. He has not come to 'lord' it over people. He is not interested in an earthly type of kingdom. His kingdom is very different – it is not of this world. It is not simply that Jesus had spoken about a different place. His words and deeds presented a different way of living, one that is not about control or power but love and service. Jesus' power comes from God and it is a power that builds people up

rather than diminishes them. He doesn't deny that he is a king but it is not the word he would use. The only thing that matters to him is the truth and that truth is God. Those who belong to God listen to the voice of Jesus, the servant king, and follow his example. We're left with the question; who or what do we belong to? We live in extremely difficult times and the Church is certainly going through a difficult time. Yet today we remember that Pius XI created this feast to help us face the harsh realities of life. The message of this feast is that we have a hope-filled future and that things will get better for our Church if we can only open ourselves to the teaching, life and rule of our Universal King, Jesus the Christ, God's

Suffering Servant.
