2nd Sunday of Lent

This is my Son Listen to him

We have an Easter moment in the Gospel reading at Mass today. Matthew presents his account of the transfiguration of Jesus on Mount Tabor in the presence of Peter, James and John.

Mountains are significant as places of encounter with God. Moses encountered God and received the commandments on Mount Sinai. In our own tradition we can recognise the importance of Croagh Patrick as a place of spiritual pilgrimage. In these elevated places there are often high moments when we get a glimpse of something greater. For the three disciples accompanying Jesus to the top of Mount Tabor, the transfiguration experience is an occasion of revelation. For a few brief moments the disciples are privileged to see Jesus transfigured in all his glory.

The three disciples were profoundly affected by what they saw on the mountain. Jesus clearly wanted to give them an insight into the bigger picture and help them understand the fulness of the message he was preaching, namely that he would die but that he would rise from the dead. By revealing himself in glory to the disciples, Jesus was preparing them for the dark days that were to lie ahead in the aftermath of the crucifixion. The memory of what they saw on the mountain top would undoubtedly sustain them when all seemed lost.

As believers in Jesus we look forward to sharing in the resurrection of Jesus and in sharing his glory in heaven. There we too see shall what Peter, James and John saw on that blessed day on the mountain. We shall see Jesus revealed in all his risen glory. This is the Good News of salvation that we celebrate as disciples of Jesus. It is the Good News that Jesus has asked us to proclaim to the whole world.



New Asteroids named after three Jesuits and a Pope

562971 Johannhagen, 551878 Stoeger, 565184 Janusz and 560974 Ugoboncompagni.

These are the names of the four asteroids named after three astronomers from the Vatican Observatory, and Pope Gregory XIII. Pope Gregory, who was born Ugo Boncompagni, is the Pope to whom we owe the reform of the calendar (later known as the Gregorian Calendar) and the beginning of the tradition of papal astronomers and observatories. The astronomers after whom three celestial bodies have been named are the Jesuits Johann Hagen, who was director of the Vatican Observatory from 1906 to 1930, Bill Stoeger, cosmologist and theologian, and Robert Janusz, currently on the staff of the Vatican Observatory. The names of the four 'famous' asteroids were published by the International Astronomical Union in its latest bulletin on 7th February. (Taken from Vatican News website)

St. Senan, Bishop (6th Century) - Feast Day 8th March

Senan's reputed birthplace was Moylough, about four miles east of Kilrush, Co. Clare. He received his first monastic formation locally on the peninsula of West Clare from the abbot Cassidan. He then went to the monastery of St Natalis at Kilnamanagh in Ossory. After he had acquired a reputation for holiness, Natalis sent him to make his own foundations. He went first to a green island in the River Slaney called *Iniscoirithe*, (the present Enniscorthy) where he had a cell. Today the parish on the east side of the River Slaney in the town of Enniscorthy is dedicated to him. Senan then went on pilgrimage to Rome and on his return journey is said to have visited the shrine of St. Martin of Tours and the Abbot David at Menevia. He may have been consecrated Bishop before he returned to Ireland. On his return he had a church at Iniscarra near Ballincollig, Co Cork, where there is still a St Senan's church today. He was already advanced in years when he came home to West Clare to establish his monastery on Scattery Island, then *Inis Cathaigh*. Senan's reputation spread far and wide. Brendan of Birr and Kieran of Clonmacnois came to visit him for spiritual direction. Before his death Senan decided to visit and pray at the cell of the abbot Cassidan, who had directed his first steps as a monk. As he made his way home and was passing Killeochaille, he was taken ill. A voice seemed to say: "Servant of God, you are being called to heaven". His companions carried him home and he died on the feast of St David in 544. They spent eight days mourning him, so his feast is on 8th March.

In this snappy weather, coming in under the archway into the grounds of the village Church, there it is in one flowerbed around the trees, the Lesser Celandine, perfectly heart shaped leaves and delightfully distinctive yellow blooms but only in sunshine.

William Wordsworth (1770--1850) loved them: "a prophet of delight and mirth".

"When hailstones have been falling swarm on swarm or blasts the greenfield and the trees distressed,

Oft have I seen it muffled up from harm, In close self shelter, Like a thing at rest".

Wordsworth had a much stronger association with the Lesser Celandine than with the Daffodil and no wonder. This gutsy little early Spring gem is in form and bloom so striking to behold.

It is delightful to all who are minutely attentive to Nature's early Spring March.

This little guy is carved on the statue of Wordsworth, beside the statue of Shakespeare in Poets' Corner in Westminster Abbey. How deadly is that!!

Walking in the Lake District, Wordsworth wrote a few poems celebrating the little guy.

Could it be that it blooms so early in Spring that it turned Wordsworth's head and quickened his quill? (Probably).
