Matthew 18:21-35

The Lord is compassion and love

In response to a question from Peter in this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus preaches a parable to the people about mercy and forgiveness. The parable is very straight forward and simple to understand. We must be generous in our dealings with others, with a generosity that we ourselves would like to experience in God's dealing with us. We cannot in good conscience call on God's mercy for our own failings if we are not merciful ourselves towards other people.

The golden rule is to always treat others as you would like them to treat you. This is really at the heart of the Gospel message we hear at Mass this weekend. It can be a challenging and demanding message. It is by no means easy to always live this teaching in our daily lives. It can be quite a struggle at times to let go of anger and resentment and to be merciful and forgiving towards those who have hurt and harmed us in life. Anger and resentment can be a heavy burden to carry. They can control us and often inhibit us from letting go and getting on with life. How often have we read or heard stories of people being liberated by being able to forgive someone who has done them grave harm?

The Psalmist reminds us today that the Lord is compassion and love, slow to anger and rich in mercy. In his earthly ministry Jesus often forgave people their sins. He associated with known sinners. He called sinners to be his disciples. In his compassion and mercy Jesus could see the potential in human people and offered them the opportunity for a fresh start, a new beginning.

Looking into our hearts and being honest with ourselves, there is not one of us who can claim to have no need for God's mercy and forgiveness. We have all failed in life. We have hurt and harmed people to a greater or lesser extent by our words and actions and likewise at times by our silence and inaction. In our daily prayer, if we are to pray sincerely the words of the Lord's Prayer – forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us – then we must constantly strive to keep an attitude of compassion and mercy to the fore in dealing with other people.

O God our Father, you are slow to anger and rich in compassion. Keep alive in us the memory of your mercy, so that our angers may be calmed and our resentments dispelled. Give us a heart ready to forgive so that we may have a heart ready to receive mercy and forgiveness from you. Amen.

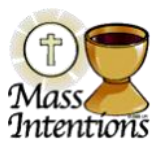

ST. PIUS OF PIETRELCINA (1887-1968) PADRE PIO

Feast Day 23rd September

Francesco Forgione was born of agricultural worker parents in the village of Pietrelcina, north-east of Naples. He joined the Capuchins, taking the name Pius and was ordained priest in 1910. He began to experience pains and what he called



"invisible stigmata". During military service in World War I, he was sent on convalescent leave. In 1918 he contracted double pneumonia and was sent to a monastery at San Giovanni Rotondo, near Foggia, where he stayed for the rest of his life. The stigmata on his hands and feet became visible and a wound in his side bled for the rest of his life. The Capuchins made no attempt to hide his condition. The Vatican had him examined and he had to say Mass in private for a number of years. Pius, always a humble man, and always dedicated to the passion of Christ would only say he was a mystery to himself. People for whom he prayed left donations. A new hospital complex was built and the place became a centre of pilgrimage and healing.

A story of his being in two places at the one time is told by his superior, Padre Carmelo da Sassano. There was a concert one evening in the monastery. During the intermission Padre Pio folded his arms on a chair in front of him and rested his head. No one disturbed him and when the intermission was over Padre Pio sat upright and gave his attention to the rest of the performance. Next day Padre Carmelo called to see a sick villager. He found the patient fully recovered and the family delighted as Padre Pio, they said, had visited them the night before. Padre Carmelo said that wasn't possible, as Padre Pio had been at the concert. But the family insisted he had come and when asked at what time, Padre Carmelo recognised it was at the time of the intermission.

On the fiftieth anniversary of the day he received the stigmata, while Padre Pio was saying Mass, people in the congregation noticed that the stigmata had vanished. He died the next day.

Sod-turning ceremony for the Regeneration Works at Corkagh Park

On Tuesday 12 September 2023, the Mayor of South Dublin County Council, Cllr. Alan Edge officially turned the sod to mark the commencement of works on the Corkagh Park Regeneration Project. The Mayor was joined by Mr. Colm Ward, Chief Executive, Ms. Teresa Walsh, Director of Services, Staff of South Dublin County Council and guests to celebrate this event.

Speaking at the event Mayor Cllr. Alan Edge said: "The works about to commence will include the creation of a new 'hub zone' with a Café building, public toilets, a multi-use events space with a stage, plaza area, seating and new planting. As part of this project the existing car parks at St. John's Road and the Green Isle Road will be improved; to include re-surfacing and upgraded pedestrian and cycling links. The Fairy Woodland Trail will be enhanced to include new play features, seating and a footpath to the lakes. Wayfinding and signage will also be upgraded throughout the park."

This project is funded by South Dublin County Council's 3-year capital budget. The Public Realm Section in South Dublin along with Building Design Partnership Limited have carried out the planning and design work on this project to date. Construction work on site will be carried out by McAvoy Contracts Ltd.
