FAMILY MATTERS

Today's Gospel takes us to the magnificent Temple in Jerusalem. A little child is brought in as all first-born males were brought. There is nothing uncommon or striking about that. His parents are with him, poor people, bringing the offering of pigeons or doves, for the purification of the mother. They are met in the temple by an old man who takes the child in his arms, offers a thanksgiving to God and blesses the parents. They are joined by a widow of eighty-four years, who gives thanks also, and speaks to others concerning the child. Then all retire. There was nothing exciting about this scene yet it was the solemn fulfilment of an ancient prophecy: "The Lord whom you seek shall suddenly come to his temple".

The infant in arms was Jesus, the Son of God, Mary and Joseph were his parents. Together they formed the Holy Family, whose feast we celebrate today. Their home was in Nazareth, a small village in lower Galilee, a long way away from the holy city of Jerusalem. Religious life there did not revolve around the Temple and its sacrifices. Like all Jews of the time, twice a day, morning and last thing at night, the

families of Nazareth confessed their faith in one God by reciting the Shema Israel: "Hear O Israel: The Lord is our God, the Lord alone. You shall love the Lord, your God with all your heart, and with all your soul and with all your might". This prayer was deeply engraved in Jesus' heart. Later in life when asked by a scribe which was the greatest commandment, Jesus quoted these words.

In that home in Nazareth Jesus grew to maturity and was filled with wisdom. Like his mother Mary, God's favour was with him. She gave him his humanity, his looks, his ways. With Joseph, she "Fed him when he needed feeding, taught him when he needed teaching, pushed and held him back when he needed them both".

Jesus' faith grew in the religious environment of Nazareth. The Sabbath was a day of rest. Families went to the synagogue to pray and listen to the Hebrew text of the Scriptures translated in Aramaic. Religious festivals and weddings were joyous occasions for eating, drinking, dancing and singing. Later when his disciples were accused of not fasting like John's disciples, Jesus defended them by saying that while they were with him, life should be a party like the days of a wedding (Mark 2:19). When he left home to announce the coming of the reign of God, did Mary ponder in her heart and recall that day in the Temple when she offered him to God and Simeon prophesied that he would be "A sign to be rejected and a sword would pierce her soul."

As his mother, she probably did.



THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD - January 6th

Traditionally in the West we associate the feast of the *Epiphany* with the three wise men from the East coming to bring gifts to the infant king. But there are other themes – baptism and Cana – originating in Egypt associated with this feast.



The word epiphany, means

"appearance" or "manifestation" was used in traditional Greek religion to indicate the appearance or manifestation of a god or goddess in human form, along with the suggestion that the person or persons who had experienced the epiphany would be delivered from danger and/or their enemies defeated.

The Christian feast of Epiphany first appears in Egypt commemorating the Baptism of Jesus, but besides this it later gathers round it other themes, such as Jesus's birth, the miracle of Cana and the coming of the Wise Men. In the West it is the coming of the Wise Men that became the dominant theme of this day, while in the East it is Jesus' Baptism in the Jordan which remains to the fore of the celebration.
