

Lessons from the Transfiguration

The Transfiguration gives us a glimpse of who Jesus really is. During his time on earth people wondered who he was. Some thought he was John the Baptist, others Elijah or one of the prophets. Peter speaking on behalf of the disciples declared Jesus as the Messiah but instead of the All-Mighty, All-Conquering Messiah that Peter wanted he was asked to accept a suffering, vulnerable Lord who would be crucified and rise from the dead.



Jesus allowed Peter, James and John to witness his transformation. During their years with him they saw his power over wind and sea, fish and fig tree, human suffering and evil spirits. Now they were to see Jesus as they never saw him before. His appearance changed dramatically. The veil was pulled back and they saw the glory of God shining through him.

With the appearance of Moses and Elijah they saw Jesus as the fulfilment of the Law and the Prophets. He was not just another prophet. He was God's Beloved Son. They were to listen to him.

The Transfiguration aimed at strengthening the faith of the disciples in anticipation of the passion and death of Jesus, but not for long. Peter, out of fear, denied Jesus three times. All deserted him and fled. John alone stood by the cross. But with the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost their faith and trust in Jesus grew stronger. The same lesson applies to us. The more we learn about Jesus the more we become like him. The more we listen to him the more we learn about him.

When the vision of the Transformation of Jesus ended, when Moses and Elijah disappeared and the voice of God the Father was silent, Peter, James and John saw "only Jesus". He alone was their focus. They had been commanded to listen to him. The lesson for us is to make Jesus our focus and to listen to him. He is our Way, our Truth and our Life.

The good news is that one day we will experience our own transformation. In John's first letter chapter 3 we read:

"We are God's children now, what we will be has not yet been revealed. When it is revealed, we will be like him for we will see him as he really is".

May They Rest in Peace

St. David, Patron of Wales (c. 500-589) Feast Day 1st March

Accounts of David's life are scarce and based on oral tradition and a 'Life' written by Rhygyfarch (11th century bishop of St David's) at a time when the Norman bishop of Canterbury, Lanfranc, was trying to impose Roman dedications on churches in England and Wales. Rhygyfarch was keen to impress on the recently arrived leaders the importance of the Welsh saint and was not above a little exaggeration. David studied at the local monastic school and after he was ordained priest, he went to study under Paulinus of Wales near the Brecon Beacons. He remained with Paulinus for several years and is said to have cured him of blindness. Paulinus sent David out to make his own monastic foundations. Rhygyfarch says David founded monasteries at Glastonbury, Bath and Leominster, but the one monastery we know he founded was that of Mynyw (Menevia) near his own birth place on the extreme south west of South Wales, facing Ireland, and now called St David's. David lived an austere life of prayer and fasting. The monastery had a most austere regime. Instead of oxen to pull the plough, the monks had to pull their plough on their own shoulders. The diet was strict - consisting of bread, bitter herbs and salt with water or a little milk. David was called Aquaticus, because he drank only water and his monks became known as the Aquatici or "watermen". Finian of Clonard and Modhomhnoc both spent time at his monastery. Rhygyfarch says David went to the Holy Land with two other Welsh monks Teilo and Padarn and that he was consecrated archbishop of Wales by the patriarch of Jerusalem – probably another exaggeration! He was bishop (probably not archbishop) of Menevia, the Roman port of Menapia in Pembrokeshire, later known as St. David's, then the chief point of departure for Ireland.

He died around 601 but he continued to be remembered in Ireland, and he is mentioned in the Martyrology of Oengus and in the Catalogue of the Saints of Ireland.
