Commanding us how to Live

The first reading we listen to at Mass this Sunday contains words we should all be familiar with.

We know them as the Ten Commandments.

The commandments are a framework intended to guide and regulate human behaviour. As presented to us in the Book of Exodus, the commandments are written in a negative format, e.g. You shall not kill, You shall not steal etc. They state baldly the kind of behaviour that ought be avoided. In contrast the approach we are more likely to use today would be a positive format of expression with the emphasis being on what we ought to be doing if we are to be truly loving people. For this reason, the commandments are often viewed today as being old-fashioned, out-moded expressions that are no longer relevant to life and living today. Nothing could be further from the truth.

Rules, regulations and guidelines permeate all aspects of human life. They are there to manage human behaviour. They outline how we, as people, relate to one another and conduct ourselves. They provide a structure and bring a sense or order to our society so that people can live in harmony with one another. They set out the values that people are expected to live by and impose penalties for those who disregard them.

For Christians, the principle that guides all our actions and behaviour is love. This love is embodied in the person of Jesus Christ who is our role model for how to live. Jesus didn't abolish the Ten Commandments. Instead he summarised and expressed them more succinctly in a positive way in the twin commandment to love God and love our neighbour. At the Last Supper, as he washed the feet of his disciples, Jesus said to them that he had given them an example so that they could imitate him in their service of one another.

In these Lenten days, when we are invited to turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel, the commandments of old can be a help to us in reflecting on our lives, in examining our consciences and in forming an honest assessment of our lives before God. The challenge then, of course, is to address those areas of our lives where the love of God and neighbour is not as we would want it to be. This is the task of every Christian during Lent.

May They Rest in Peace

We remember in our prayers the people and intentions we have been asked to pray for during this week.



Saints Perpetua and Felicity, Martyrs (3rd Century) Feast Day: 7th March

Perpetua was a young married woman of twenty-two and Felicity a slave-girl, far advanced in pregnancy. They were still catechumens when they were arrested at Carthage (near Tunis in present-day Tunisia) with four male catechumens under an edict of Emperor Septimius Severus (193-211) that forbade fresh conversions to Christianity. They were all baptised while they were kept under guard in a private house awaiting execution. Asked to offer a sacrifice for the prosperity of the emperors, she refused. When asked, "Are you a Christian?" she replied, "Yes, I am," and so condemned herself to death. Meanwhile, Felicity, fearing she would not have a martyr's death with the rest, because Roman law forbade the execution of pregnant women, prayed her child would be born while she was still in prison. It was. A Christian couple promptly adopted it. Having survived the animals, the women were to be

Having survived the animals, the women were to be executed. A nervous gladiator tried to kill Perpetua, but failed to finish the job until she guided the knife to her throat. Although the execution was intended as entertainment for the jeering crowd, some spectators, inspired by the martyrs' fearlessness, became converts to Christianity. They died in 203 AD in Carthage.

A magnificent basilica was erected over their tomb, the *Basilica Majorum*; that the tomb was indeed in this basilica has been proved by Père Delattre, who in 1907 discovered there an ancient inscription bearing the names of the martyrs.
