SYMBOLS OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

When we think of, experience or pray to the Holy Spirit, we tend to use a variety of images and symbols to help us imagine the invisible Holy Spirit and be more aware of His presence and activity in our lives. All the many symbols of the Holy Spirit come from the Bible. Among the best known are water, wind, fire, and a dove.

Water signifies birth and life. It is vital for all life. In Baptism it represents the cleansing and life-giving action of the Holy Spirit. Scripture is full of instances where water symbolises the Spirit. Jesus promised the Spirit as living water to the Samaritan woman he encountered at the well saying: "The water that I will give will become a spring of water gushing up to eternal life". Paul in Romans 5:5 speaks of "the love of God poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit". Water, with cloud, speaks of the presence of God's Spirit in the world directing, moving, breathing, pouring out and blessing.

Scripture likens the Spirit to the wind. The original Hebrew and Greek words for wind is "ruah." Today's reading from Acts describes the sudden rush of a violent wind that came from heaven and filled the house where the friends of Jesus were gathered. "All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit".

Fire symbolises the transforming energy of the actions of the Holy Spirit. John the Baptist proclaimed Jesus as the one who will baptise with the Holy Spirit and with fire. Jesus himself said that he came to cast fire on the earth. The fire of Pentecost reminds us of the burning bush on Mount Sinai from which God spoke to Moses. During the Exodus, the people of God were led by a pillar of fire at night. Like the wind, fire reminds us of the strength and force of the Holy Spirit.

One of the most common symbols of the Holy Spirit is the dove. In the Old Testament it was the dove that signalled the end of the flood. At his baptism Jesus saw "the Spirit, like a dove, descending on him (Mark 1:10). The dove is a symbol of love, peace and purity. Saint Teresa of Avila wrote "The Holy Spirit comes like a gentle dove, bringing peace and a sense of God's loving presence".

Psalm to the Wind of Heaven

O wind that blows when and where it will, teach me to reverence the Wind of Heaven.

Open me up to the mysterious Breath of God.

Wind of Inspiration, Creative Spirit of God, teach me not to forget that you come always as gift.

May I ever be sensitive to your gentle breezes and willing to soar with your wild winds.

Sacramental Preparation Team

St Rita of Cascia (1386 - 1457) Feast Day 22nd May

Born at Roccaporena, near Spoleto, in Umbria, Italy, Rita wished in childhood to become a nun, but out of respect for her parents wishes she married Paolo Mancini, a quick-tempered man with many enemies, who was notoriously violent and unfaithful. They had two sons. Rita endured insults and infidelity for eighteen years till one day Paolo was brought home dead after being murdered in a revenge-killing.

In 1407, Rita, then a widow, wanted to enter the Augustinian convent at Cascia, but the nuns refused, fearing her husband's family and their rivals. However, Rita started a campaign of prayer which resulted in her miraculous entry. During the night, when the doors to the monastery were locked and the sisters

were asleep, her patron saints Saint John the Baptist, Saint Augustine, and Saint Nicholas of Tolentino appeared to her and miraculously transported her inside the convent. When the nuns found her inside the convent in the morning and heard how she entered, they felt they could not turn her away. Rita remained there, living by the Augustinian Rule, and giving herself to intense meditation on the passion of Jesus until her death. Rita's last years found her confined to bed as an invalid and she died of tuberculosis in 1457.


