WHO IS MY NEIGHBOUR?

A question from a religious expert leads directly to Jesus telling the story of the Good Samaritan. The Lawyer knows he must love God and neighbour but who is his neighbour? Who must he love? Who is not his neighbour?

Jesus tells the story of a man, a Jew, who when travelling down a dangerous stretch of road from Jerusalem to Jericho was set upon by robbers who left him stripped, beaten and half dead. By chance a priest and a Levite pass by but for religious reasons they ignore the man in the ditch. One can be outwardly religious but inwardly cold. A Samaritan came, the last person a Jew would expect help from. Jews and Samaritans did not associate due to disagreements over religious beliefs and places of worship. But this Samaritan put all that aside when confronted by someone in need. Without knowing the injured man and without counting the cost, he saw him as deserving of his time and attention.

"Go and do the same" was Jesus' advice to the lawyer who asked the question. In our wounded and hurting society, we have to decide whether to be a Good Samaritan or an indifferent passerby. Always being in a hurry keeps us from stopping or even noticing a person in need. Every person in need is our neighbour. How much you know or what religion or social strata you belong to does not matter. What matters is how much you love.

The Samaritan showed love by the loving way he responded. Love is not a feeling but a deliberate choice. It is a command not an option. Love transcends cultural boundaries and personal biases.

The Good Samaritan challenges us to look beyond our prejudices and extend mercy to the overlooked and throwaways of our modern society, addicts and those mentally and physically challenged, refugees and migrants and the elderly. They may not be far from where we live, just out of sight but not out of reach.

Jesus said: "As long as you did it to one of these you did it to me" (Matt 25:40)

St Camillus de Lellis (1550-1614) Feast Day : 14th July

As a young soldier, Camillus was rough tempered and a gambler who, when he was twenty five, was converted by St Philip Neri. He became a priest and worked for the sick. He founded an order, the Servants of the Sick and a series of hospitals where many otherwise "incurable" patients could go. Camillus went to Rome and began to care for patients at the Hospital of St James for Incurables, where he had previously been a patient. He had the idea of getting people to care for the sick out of charity, and set up a house with two like-minded companions. They got financial support from some wealthy patrons and worked initially at the Hospital of the Holy Spirit in Rome. St Philip Neri (1515-95) helped Camillus spiritually. Despite all the help he got, Camillus found it difficult to put his project into effect, so he decided to study for the priesthood and was ordained a priest in 1584. Camillus insisted on professional standards of care – isolating those with infectious diseases, the provision of a good diet, always

seeking a cure, as well as provision of a good diet, always seeking a cure, as well as providing for their spiritual welfare. He also stressed that the last moments of a life are the most precious. Camillus himself suffered from a number of long-term illnesses, but despite this, spent most of his time in serving the sick and in prayer. He resigned from being the superior general of the order in

1607, but the order continued to expand both in the cities of Italy and in Hungary.

He died in 1614 and was buried in the Church of St Mary Magdalen in Rome. Pope Benedict XIV canonised him in 1746. In 1930, Pope Pius XI named St. Camillus de Lellis, together with St. John of God, principal co-patron of nurses and of nurses' associations.

NELSON MANDELA INTERNATIONAL DAY 18th July

November 2009 - in recognition of the former South African President's contribution to the culture of peace and freedom, UN General Assembly declares 18 July "Nelson Mandela International Day". Resolution A/RES/64/13 recognizes Mandela's values and his dedication to the service of humanity in: conflict resolution; race relations; promotion and protection of human rights; reconciliation; gender equality and the rights of children and other vulnerable groups; the fight against poverty; the promotion of social justice. The resolution acknowledges his contribution to the struggle for democracy internationally and the promotion of a culture of peace throughout the world. December 2015 - the General Assembly decides to extend the scope of Nelson Mandela International Day to also be utilized in order to promote humane conditions of imprisonment, raise awareness about prisoners being a continuous part of society, and to value the work of prison staff as a social service of particular importance. General Assembly resolution <u>A/RES/70/175</u> not only adopted the revised United Nations Standard Minimum Rules for the Treatment of Prisoners, but also approved that they should be known as the "Nelson Mandela Rules" in order to honour the legacy of the late President of South Africa, who spent 27 years in prison in the course of his struggle referred to above.
